It is the avowed object to oppose the large knitting combines, and to place its products on the market at a cheaper price than the Trusts can do, as well as to enable its shareholders to share in the profits of the Syndicate, and to make money at their own homes. The plan of the Syndicate is novel and engaging. To each subscriber for 20, \$1.00 shares in the Syndicate, a knitting machine is given, and the member is then supplied with yarn to manufacture at his or her own home, such knitted goods as the Syndicate requires. The Syndicate promises cash payments for the knitting done by the shareholders, and also to divide among its members semi-annually the net profits, realised from the sale of goods made by shareholders for the Syndicate. The Syndicate should have no difficulty in disposing of knitted goods which are always in demand. The plan seems to be a good one and is in the hands of well known Toronto gentlemen. It should be a great success.
