The young hear these flippant conversations by their elders, and is it any wonder if they decide that stealing on a big scale is rather commendable than otherwise. Then, again, a man is said to be "smart" when he robs a bank. Why, smart? If you are placed in a position of trust, and violate your trust, is it a great sign of ability. I cannot see that it is.

Would it be possible under any circumstances to get a system of taxation that would please all parties in the community and offend nobody? Evidently some persons think, yes. It seems much easier to get a system that will please nobody and offend everybody. It's an awful kick we have about taxes in this town every year, and the biggest kickers are those who have least difficulty in paying. But then, that is always the case. The more money a man accumulates, the meaner he gets. It is a law of nature and nature's laws cannot be departed from. If any of these men "with a stake" will swap places with me, I will pay their taxes, and enter into bonds, not to grumble for ten years, at the taxes. I would like to see a lot of this vacant property pay heavy taxes. I mean, particularly property, in the heart of the town, held for speculative purposes. If you go to purchase or rent such land, you are asked a big figure, while the taxes are practically nil. All the time this vacant property is increasing in value. Every improvement made in its vicinity, enhances its value. The owner of the vacant property derives the benefit. He should be taxed in proportion as the value of his property is increased. Some thoughtful people in Fredericton are trying to arrive at some equitable system of taxation to recommend to the town council for adoption. It certainly is not consistent with the progress of the twentieth century that our taxes should be regulated, by guesswork.

But, above all let there be no "saw-offs" no "arrangements" in future as to non-protecting.
