**PARTY POLITICS, ETC.**  
 We are not drifting away from the party idea. On the contrary the party is all powerful, and the unfortunate individual who ventures to keep it out of its boundaries is in a disagreeable kind of limbo. The great men of the politicians have about concluded that it will be well to bring dominion politics into county and town affairs. Of course, each party accuses the other of being the first mover in bringing about this state of affairs. That would seem to argue that each party is rather ashamed that dominion politics should be brought into local affairs, or if not, why should there be this very manifest desire to blame "the other fellow" for it?

It really seems necessary to have party government, although as Goldwin Smith says, at the time of elections a condition almost like civil war exists. But it must be remembered that the parties are the creatures of the state. They are not pretty or attractive creatures, and their characters are becoming less prepossessing every day.

How far should we follow the party? If the party says, "Thou shalt not buy goods of a *Grit* or *Tory*," as the case may be, should we reply "We will buy no goods, then, most noble Master."

If the party says, "You must not speak to such and such when you meet them on the street," shall the loyal elector reply "We will not speak to that person, most illustrious Party."

There is one saving element in the party idea. A lot of fellows who promise that they will vote for the party, vote quite differently when the day comes. As a matter of morals, is an elector bound to vote for the man or party whom he promises, when this promise is secured by threats, or co-ercion, or duress, or the trickery with which the successful politician doth trick?

We would gladly give such an one a dispensation, had we the giving of the same. If a robber binds you and threatens to shoot you unless you promise that you will not tell on him, you do not feel bound to keep such a promise, and the man, especially the poor man, who is forced to promise his vote, is quite guiltless in our opinion, if he relieves himself from an obligation most corruptly obtained.

We would not mind the party business so much, if it did not breed such an endless talk about politics. One gets horribly sick of it all, and heartily wishes that the politicians of Canada had formed a regiment to go to the war in South Africa. They might have talked the Boers to death.

**A Wonderful Piano.**  
 The oldest of all pianos manufactured up to date will shortly start from San Francisco for a long tour of the world. With it will go its inventor and manufacturer, Moritz Rosenthal, the famous pianist, whose ingenuity has produced something really new under the sun.

The piano is anti-climatic—that is to say, it is proof against all atmospheric changes that heretofore have assailed all perambulating pianos. Tested carefully and thoroughly with all degrees of heat and cold, dryness and moisture, it has demonstrated that none of these conditions can affect its tone quality.

The inventor has "treated" it after prescriptions known only to himself. The piano, which is smaller than a small grand, has had all kinds of experiments tried upon it, until now it is perfected—neither the tropics nor the arctic can disturb its musical serenity. The length of the instrument is five feet, its width three feet. Beautifully polished rosewood will encase its mechanism, and its sounding board was brought from Germany.

All of the 7000 pieces used in its construction were handled by the musician himself during the many months that the piano has been building.

From San Francisco it will go to Australia, and then will tour through England, Germany, Faance, Italy. It will travel by train and ox team and possibly camel-back for its owner proposes taking it to Africa and all kinds of out of the way places.

A travelling overcoat of metal, lined with a layer of felt and ore of chamois, flat on the bottom, rounded on the top and hermetically sealed, is provided for this medicated music box.

Just how precious such an instrument as this will be to Moritz Rosenthal can be best understood by music lovers. The average piano is a tender instrument, but here is one that can stand any treatment.

**BETTER TIMES COMING.**  
 An Important New Industry with Headquarters Here.

The indications are that Woodstock will soon experience a boom in business, and that the days of depression are about over. The closing of two saw mills was quite a blow to the place, but it was inevitable. It will not be a surprise to everybody to find a company organized in the not distant future with the object of manufacturing all manner of wooden implements such as rake and fork handles, a certain class of waggons and carriages. This subject has been talked of for some time, and an extra stimulus was given to the project by the visit here of Mr. W. White a member of the firm of Sharp & Tyles dealers in wood of Liverpool, Eng. Mr. White stated that there is an unlimited demand in England for just the kind of manufactured articles which can be handled with a profit in this county. Of course an industry of this nature is now only talked of, when it may get beyond the range of talk and become a practical operation is more or less problematical.

There is an industry the headquarters of which has been placed in Woodstock which needs special mention. It is the business conducted by the Carleton Creamery Co. The Company buys milk and manufactures butter which during the past season has found a ready market in Great Britain. The town having offered the Company reasonable inducements, they are now erecting their new building on the railway a little below the old station. The buildings when completed will be exactly what is required for the company's use. The main building connected with this industry, just nearing completion is 30 x 81 and annexed is an engine and boiler room 16 x 24. The main building is a story and a half high and is shingled on the roof and sides. At the north end is an apartment 30 feet square which will be used as an ice house. Air spaces are arranged between the walls, and this will do away with putting sawdust among the ice. The company have their own cutting apparatus complete, and being near the river can get their ice with little difficulty. Last year they used at the old station about 800 cakes. This year they expect to use nearly 4000 cakes. The main building is further sub divided into two cold storage rooms, and 30 feet is cut off for a work room, while good quarters up stairs will be available for an office. Entirely separate from this main building is another structure 18 x 30 which will be used for general purposes. A railway siding is to be built up to the floor of the main building and the railway company will provide refrigerator cars. All the milk supplied by the farmers in the immediate vicinity of town will be brought to this building and the cream from various skimming stations throughout the country will be brought here. Last year there were eight skimming stations. This year it is expected their will be fourteen. This industry means a great deal to the farmers of the country and will be found to be considerable of an addition to the industries of Woodstock. Word has been received from England where he went for his health that Mr. George E. Phillips who is to be credited with starting this valuable institution is improving and it is hoped that he will be able to return to Woodstock by March.

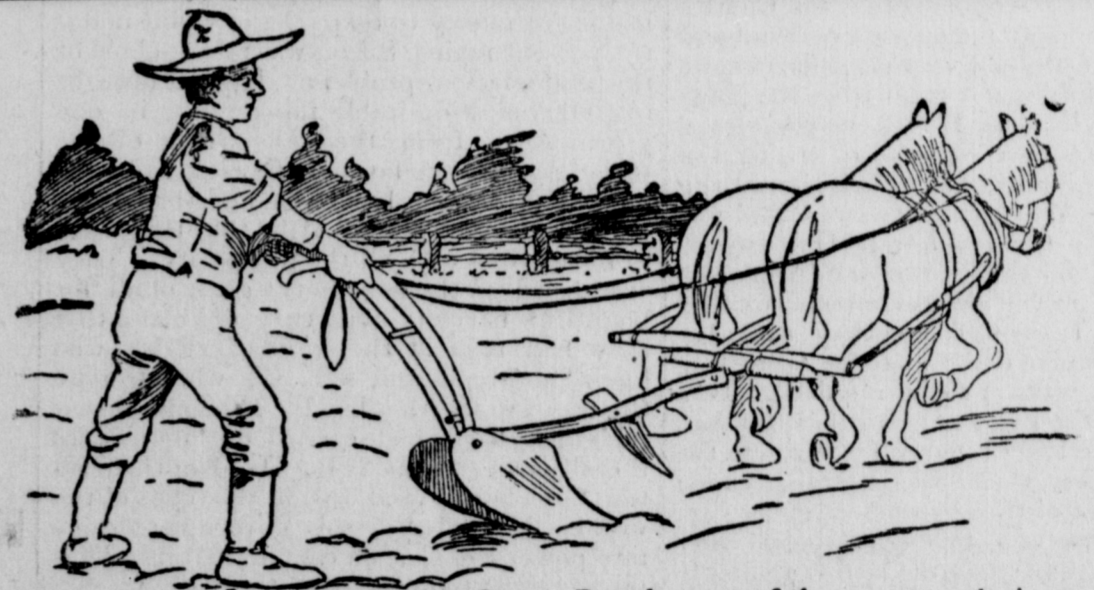
