#### CANADA IN THE CASE.

Those of us who read the U. S. papers of the more advanced style, have noticed that, of late Canada has been pretty roundly abused, being a hindrance to an amicable settlement of all outstanding questions between The Empire and the States. Mr. Smalley, the New York correspondent of the London Times joined in this hue and cry. But the Times goes out of its way to show that the views of that journal in London are vastly different from the views of the New York correspondent. In the issue of June 2nd., just to hand, the Times says, in a leading editorial: "Our correspondent takes what we trust will prove to be an unduly gloomy iew of the situation. We shall deeply deplore the breakdown of the negotiations, if it occurs, but we must decline to exhaust our emotions prematurely over a disaster which may never take place."

Proceeding the Times says:-"What is quite obvious from the turn of our correspendent's communication is that those Americans, for whom he speaks do not by any means grasp the nature of our relation with our self-governing colonies. It is as much out of place to talk of Canadian opinion, as a power behind the British government deterring that government from acting as its own Chief Minister and Ambassador think reasonable, as it would be to use similar language of the opinion of one of the American States. Americans cannot really expect us to do what they would never do themselves if they were in our position. They cannot expect us to ignore the popular will of that portion of the Empire which is primarily affected by the negotiations, or to settle the question between London and Washington behind its back. this country about the frontiers of Maine the local legislature protested against the award of an umpire and the United States Senate rejected it, though President Jackson would have joined our government in accepting it. Was this an unworthy submission by the Federal Government to local prejudice?"

In this province of New Brunswick we have good reason to remember the treaty by which the boundary of Maine was settled. It is hard for us to even discuss that question with patience. Had the Times of that day supported us then, as it is doing now, New Brunswick would have been a far wealthier province that it is.

Searching for a King's Body. Ever since last autumn an agitation has been going on in the Neapolitan province in connection with the supposed resting place of King Joachin Marat, and schemes have been set on foot by living representatives of the of the Murat family to exhume and provide a proper monument for the body of the unfortunate monarch. Researches were begun recently in the Church of St. George the Martyr at Pizzo, near Naples where Murat was known to have been buried after his execution on October 13, 1815; in the castle of that city. The common burial-place was opened after due precautions by the sanitary authorities, but no positive result could be arrived at, and it was found that the buryingplace in the vaults of the church have been filled with the podies of victims of the cholera epidemic of 1837, and it was impossible to distinguish the body of the King from those of persons subsequently interred. The researches have been suspended, the vaults sealed up, and a report drawn up and signed by the local authorities and the representatives of the family to the effect that further investigations are useless. All the expenses of the researches have been borne by the Government.—London Post..


