which the son was probably the most to blame. But the accuracy of the old man's shooting was the thing that astonished everybody, considering he is eighty years of age. The gun he fired was loaded with buck shot, the distance was long, for a Boer, even, yet old man Oakes went straight for the mark. One shot cut the jugular vein in his son's neck, the other broke the finger of his son's wife, who had her arm around her husband's neck, trying, no doubt to get him in the house. It was a gruesome affair, and it is a peculiar incident that Houlton gaol should contain two murderers, one convicted of killing his father, the other found guilty of murdering his son.

The authorities tell me there is no news of the Swede, Bjorkman, who shot in a lumber camp a man named Johnson, in a very cold blooded manner. They think he has crossed "the liner." At any rate he is at large. Probably the Aroostook authorities will not be sorry if he escapes. Murder trials costs money, and Aroostook has had more than her share. One sometimes is led to wonder, if it is well to be too humanitarian. Capital punishment has terrors for the lawless, which no life imprisonment may inspire, particularly when, through the entreaty of many appeals, the life term is apt to be reduced to a few years. The gallows are grim, but the gossip as to the last scene is apt to lead lawless spirits to refrain from testing the quality and texture of the rope.
