Some Rubens pictures brought good prices  
in London recently. They came from Leigh  
Court, and their genuineness was undoubted.  
"The Holy Family, with Four Saints" was  
sold for \$42,400; it was bid in at 5000 guineas  
in 1884. The big Conversion of Saul" brought  
\$9965; it sold for \$20,450 in 1806  
and for \$17,900 in 1884. The "Woman  
Taken in Adultery," from the Knyp collection,  
brought \$9965, for about which sum it  
has been sold several times in the last hun-  
dred years. Two Franz Hals portraits, a  
man and a woman, brought \$15,330 and \$10-  
220 respectively. J. S. Copley's portrait of  
Susannah Randolph of Virginia sold for \$21-  
50, a George Romney portrait of a woman  
for \$7400, a Raeburn portrait of a young girl  
for 9700, and a Hoppner portrait of Shelley's  
first wife for \$7050. A colored engraving of  
Romney's "Lady Hamilton as Nature" sold  
for \$2400, a record price.

proaching cowardice.

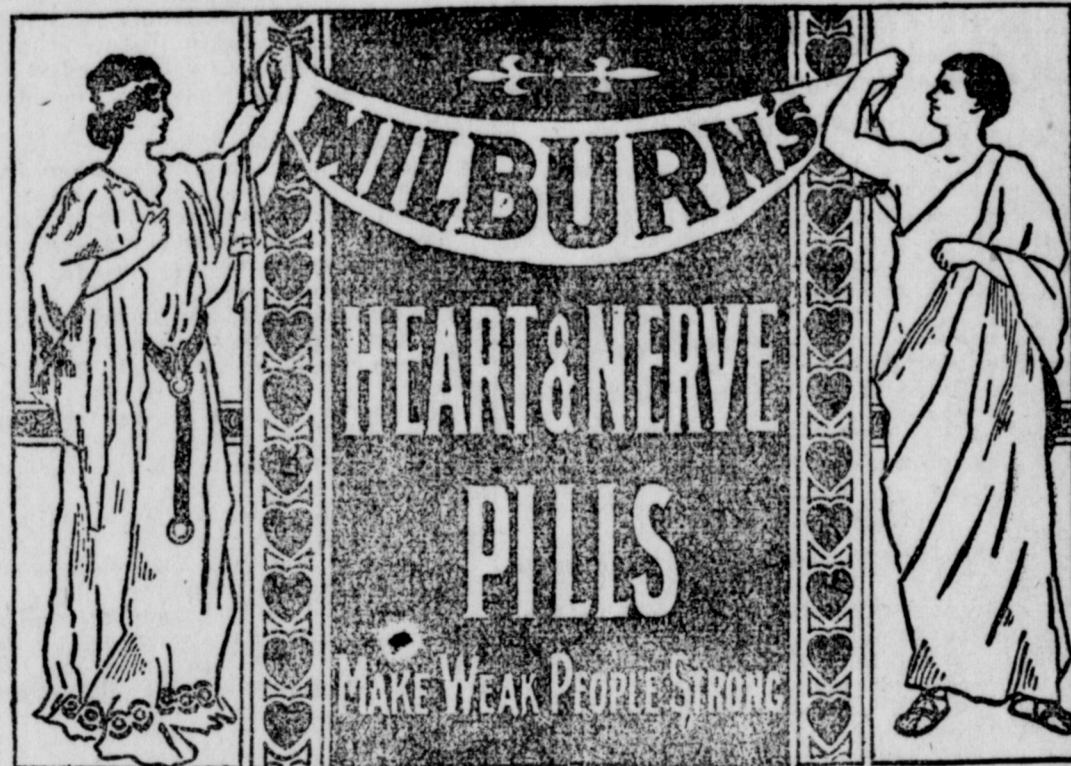
All men of genius are said to have eyes

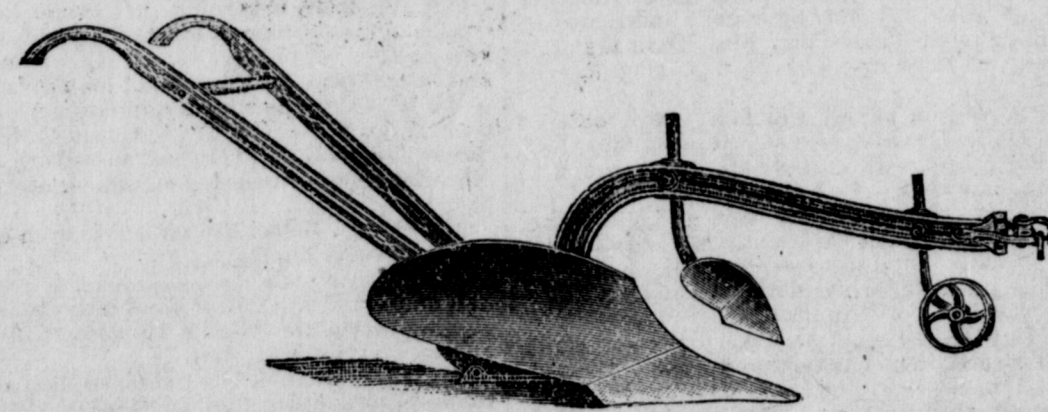
His Position—"Now, how do you stand on

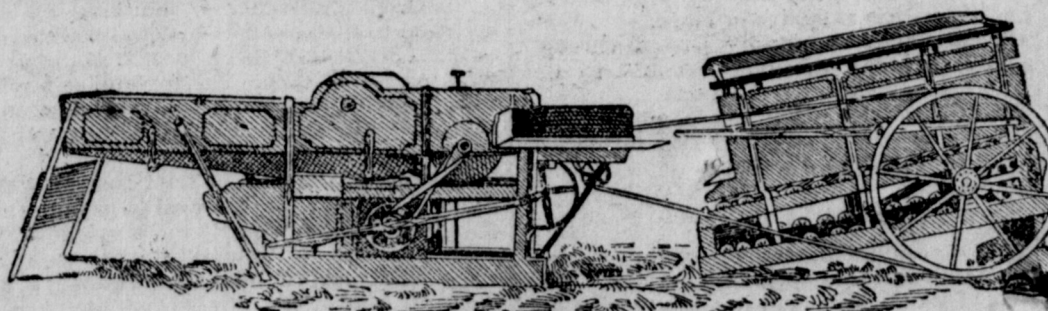
