THE Summer School of Science for the Atlantic Provinces of Canada meets at Bear River N. S. on Thursday July 26th and keeps open until August 10th. Among the prominent names on the faculty are Prof. Bailey of the University of New Brunswick Prof. Andrews of Mount Allison University, and G. U. Hay of St. John. Mrs. Gilchrist of St. John will manage the evening concerts. Dr. Drummond of Montreal will be present at some of the evening meetings. Courses of study are given in Botany, Anhydrous Chemistry, Chemistry, Education, Elocution, English Literature, Geology, Kindergarten, Music, Physics and Meteorology, Physiology and Hygiene, Geology and Entomology. Each student is charged a registration fee of \$2 50, to be paid to the secretary-treasurer. At the time of enrolment, this registration fee entitles the student to admission to all the ordinary classes. An additional fee of \$2 per subject will be charged for advanced classes, to be paid to the instructor. Board can be secured for from \$3 to \$5 per week. To secure board at reduced rates application must be made to the local Secretary, W. E. Read, Esq., Bear River, N. S., not later than June 15th.

THE EDUCATIONAL REVIEW supplementary readings for June, edited by G. U. Hay, has come to hand. Among the articles are "History of Fruit Culture in Canada," by Geo. Johnson; "Father LeClerq's Voyage in 1677 from Nepisiguit to Miramichi," by W. F. Ganong, Ph. D.; "Notes on Madawaska," by Rev. W. O. Raymond, M. A.; "An Old Time Conflagration; and an article entitled "Before the Loyalists," by James Hannay, D. C. L. This last article tells something of those people who came from Massachusetts from 1762 onward, coming before the Loyalists. Their descendants now include some of the best known families in New Brunswick, among the names being those of Simonds, White, Hazen, Quinton, Lovett, Atherton, Burpee, Barker, Beckwith, Coye, Coburn, Dow, Estey, Estabrooks, Godsoe, Garrison, Glazier, Hartt, Marsh, Nevins, Peabody, Perley, Pickard, Plummer, Rideout, Ring, Whitney, Woodman and Woodworth. Some of these names had also representatives among the Loyalists, but most of the people now bearing them are descendants of the ante-Loyalist settlers from Massachusetts. Historians of the early times in New Brunswick have almost entirely neglected these people and Dr. Hannay is doing a good work in telling us something about them.

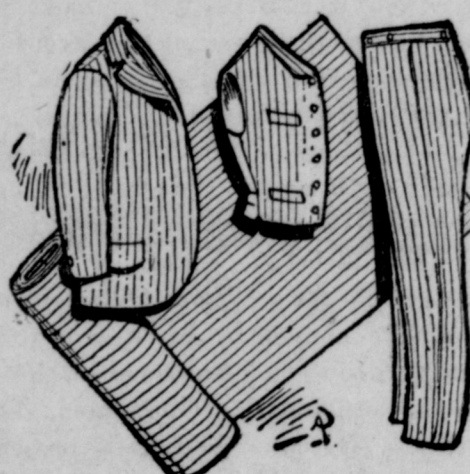

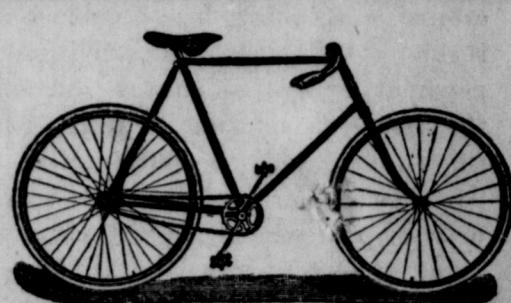
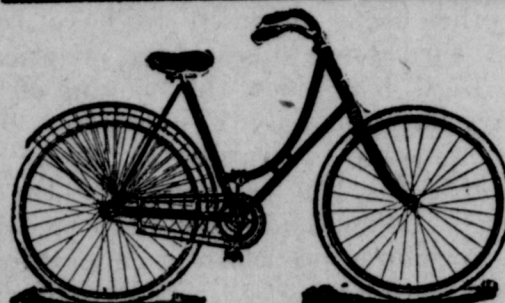
