AGAINST KRUGERISM.

Mr. Rhodes' Speech at the Congress of the South African League.

The Cape papers give full reports of the Presidential address delivered by Mr. Cecil Rhodes at the opening of the congress of the South African League at Cape Town on Oct. 10. From this speech the following extracts are taken.—

Concerning the question at issue in the contest, he said:—

"Well, gentlemen, we have had a great battle. And whom have we been fighting? We have been fighting the Dutch. Let us be quite clear about that. (Cheers.) We have been fighting Krugerism. (Loud cheers.) I remember speaking to Dr. Leyds at Bloemfontein when we went up to the opening of the railway, and I said to him:—"Why don't you impress upon Kruger this and that change?" He said:—"I assure you, Mr. Rhodes, we have no power whatever. The government of the Transvaal is Kruger, and Kruger alone." He said:—"I am kept because I am useful, but I can assure you that if you think I influence him in the direction of maintaining monopolies, keeping out the Uitlanders, and the various other gross grievances which were created in the Transvaal—if you think we support him in that, you are making a great mistake. Always remember that the government of the Transvaal is Kruger, and Kruger alone." And that is what we are fighting, and it is marvellous, really, if you think of it, how everyone comes to the same conclusion.

In discussing the future, Mr. Rhodes held out the olive branch to the Dutch:—"I would say to the Dutch, "If your policy is to be race antagonism race feeling, and to fight in two camps it is a hopeless thing." It is hopeless for the Dutch, and it is hopeless for the English. . . . We on our side are prepared to go on the basis of equal rights into the constitutional struggle of self-government. We hope it won't be Dutch on one side and English on the other. We hope it will be the best man to the front, whatever his race is (Cheers.) Surely the Dutch will consider that position.

The Wheat Crop.

The wheat crop of Carleton County this year is estimated at 60,000 bushels, which will grind up into 10,000 bbls. of flour. This is about four times more wheat than was raised in Carleton County four years ago.
