A Peculiar Development from the Negro Question.

Owners and captains of steamboats plying in the Chesapeake Bay and the Potomac River are, says the New York Post, in a quandary over the application of the Virginia separate coach law. This statute, which requires that separate but similiar accomodations be provided for white and colored passengers, applies to steamboats as well as railroads. On the railroads the discrimination is readily made, by furnishing separate cars or by building a partition in the cars, but how to separate the races on a steamboat, and to give one race as good a place as the other, is a problem to which the Virginia lawmakers probably gave no thought, and which the steamboat men are disposed to turn over to the courts for settlement. The question raised for the courts to decide is this: "Can a steamboat company, running in Virginia waters, be punished for disobeying a law which, in the nature of the construction of steamboats of the most modern build, can not from a physical standpoint be obeyed ?" 



Starch Made From Potatoes.



Nearly sixteen thousand tons of potato starch are, says the Saturday Evening Post, turned out annually in the United States. The potatoes used for starch are the small and injured ones of the crop. Sixty bushels of them yield a barrel of starch. They are washed and reduced to a pulp by machine, and the pulp is carried by water into tanks, at the bottom of which the starch settles. The starch is then transfered by shovels to another receptacle, where it is stirred and beaten to a cream. After settling again, to remove all impurities, it needs only to be dried in order to be fit for commercial use. The drying is done in kilns, by steam coils, and, when the starch comes out, it is so white and beautiful as to resenble driven snow. The commercial starches in use today are made from maize, potatoes, rice, wheat, sage flour and tapioca flour. Rice starch commands the highest price, and maize starch is the cheapest. Wheat starch comes next in value to rice starch, and potato starch third on the list.

WORKMEN SENT BACK.

A Toronto Violation of the Alien Labor Act.

Toronto, Oct. 10-Edward Williams, the alien labor afficer of the dominion government today ordered the deportation before Saturday noon, of five United States workmen engaged in the interior decoration of the residence of a prominent citizen. The contract had been let to a Cleveland, Ohio, firm, who sub-let the contract to another Clevelander. The latter pleaded ignorance of the Canadian law forbibiddiug the importation of alien workmen. These are the first deportations made from Toronto under the alien labor act and others are likely to follow.
