



## THE CHINESE TROUBLE.

NEW YORK, Sept. 30 .- The Shanghai correspondent of the Evening Sun cables to his paper under date of the 25th, as follows: "The memorial sent to the throne by Li Hung Chang and the Viceroys of the Southern and Central provinces, asking for the denunciation of Prince Tuan, Prince Chwang and the leaders of the Boxer movement, was delayed in transmission, and was not received by Emperor Kwang-su and the Dowager Empress, who were at Tai-yuenfu until September 18. The Emperor handed the memorial to the Council, and after it had been read he began a bitter tirade against Tuan and Chwang, He told them they were responsible for all the trouble. They had, he said only the ability to start trouble, and did not care for the consequences. Prince Tuan and Prince Chwang sat together. The Emperor pointed his finger at them and said: 'You have caused all the inconvenience and disgrace of the court and King being compelled to leave Pekin. Now, can't you make a


