

**To Encourage The Beautiful.**  
(Bangor Commercial.)

A new line of work for state agricultural departments is pointed out in an announcement by the Pennsylvania department of its purpose to use all available means of beautifying the landscape in that state. All classes have been invited to assist in this work, the road commissioners, the forestry commissioners, private citizens, and corporations. Where nature has furnished a basis of beauty, an attempt will be made to develop her evident purpose, in villages and along highways, in country places and upon the banks of streams.

This is not to be done in a haphazard way. The best expressions of rural landscape development in England have been studied, and, as far as practicable, will be copied, or rather the methods and principles which have produced them will be applied under these new conditions.

To many persons this may seem a departure from the legitimate field of an agricultural department, where utility is everything, but it is a welcome departure. It is not a lessening of the practical work, but an addition of the aesthetic; and its aestheticism may be very practical in one respect, in its expected attack on the advertising signs which now disfigure the landscape. It was Goethe who said: "We should do our utmost to encourage the beautiful for the useful encourages itself," and in this view such public improvements as are to be undertaken in Pennsylvania are correct. Our own state might well do some work in this direction, and thus make our national scenery contribute more directly to the advantage of Maine as a summer residence and resort.

**Home Remedies for Coughs.**

Horehound candy is very desirable for a throat cold. Take a tablespoonful of dried horehound leaves steeped in a half cupful of boiling water. When cold, strain off the liquid and turn into an enameled kettle. Add to it a pound of granulated sugar and a teaspoonful of vinegar. Boil gently, without stirring, and remove any scum that may rise to the top. When the candy becomes brittle in cold water, take immediately from the fire and pour into a buttered pan or plates. It should be of clear, beautiful brown color.

Here is also a recipe for some simple cough drops: Boil two pounds of granulated sugar, one-half pint of water and one quarter teaspoonful of cream of tartar to the soft crack degree. Keep the sides of the saucepan clear. Add a half pound of fine fresh butter and one-half ounce of ground ginger; let boil to the hard crack degree; turn out on to a large platter when cool enough to turn up the edges; add 20 drops of good lemon extract and half an ounce of best ground tartaric acid; work the whole well together, pull it out and cut up into cushions with a pair of scissors. These may be bottled, dusted with a little powdered sugar to keep them from sticking.

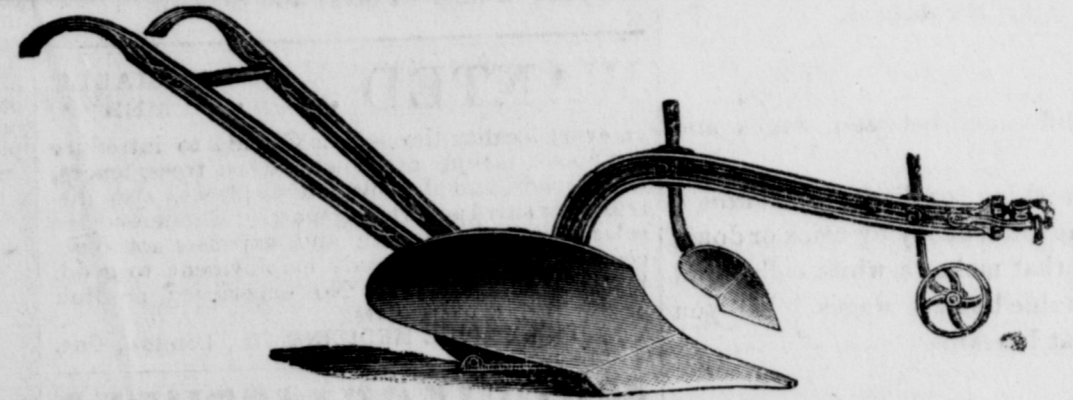
