A RATIONAL SUNDAY.

Goldwin Smith on the Modern View of the Day of Rest.

In reply to an invitation to attend a meeting of the Rational Sunday League, Mr. Goldwin Smith says:

Though I shall not be able to attend your meeting I am with you in your desire for a Rational Sunday. If you could succeed in setting us free from austere traditions on this subject you would be lifting a cloud from life.

The inestimable value of a day of rest we all acknowledge, and we all admit that in order to fence the general privilege against individual greed it is necessary that it should be protected by law.

Nobody now, I imagine, supposed that we are bound by the Jewish ordinance of the Sabbath. Nobody, in fact, pretends to observe it. The very ground on which the commandment is based, embodying the primitive idea of the creation of the world, shows that it belongs to the past.

That Saint Paul did not deem the ordinance of the Sabbath in any form of lasting obligation on the Christian Church we know as Dean Alford says, from the Apostle's words in Colossians II, 16, 17. Again, St. Paul says, "One man esteemeth one day above another; another esteemeth every day alike."

Traced to its historical origin our modern strictness may probably be said to be Calvinistic, and to have had its source partly at least in antagonism to the calendar of the Church of Rome.

Even looking at the matter from the most Orthodox point of view, therefore, we may consider ourselves at liberty to deal with the question in the manner most conducive to our welfare, physical and moral, as well as religious, in the circumstances of the present day.

The political franchise is given us for public purposes, not for the purpose of forcing our fellow-citizens to conform to our personal beliefs and habits. It is time that a line should be drawn, and that the sphere of private liberty should be distinguished from that of public law.

It is needless to say that we are bound to abstain from any employment of labor not strictly necessary on the Day of Rest, and from anything that can interfere with the devotional habits of others.

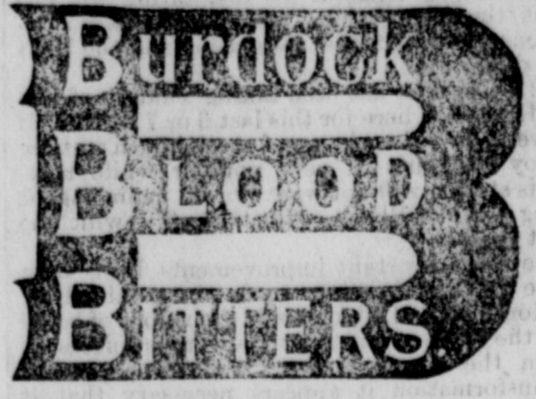
