The First School in Canada. (The Chatauquan for November.)

Madame de la Peltrie's life in New France is inseparably associated with the school she founded, for it afterwards developed into the great Ursuline seminary of Quebec, still active and flourishing after more than two and a half centuries. She and her companions took up their residence in a little tworoomed house previously used as a warehouse which they playfully called their palace. It was in the lower Town, near what is now know as the Champlain Market. The French inn now occupying this site is so old and quaint and foreign that the traveller stopping there finds little difficulty in carrying himself back over the long fight of years and conjuring up vivid pictures of the landing of these gentle French ladies.

The school began with six Indian and a few French girls. But soon reports of this wonderful institution, where girls, irrespective of race or condition, were taken in, clothed in beautiful garments and given plen y of food, spread throughout the neighbouring country, and crowds of red skinned maidens flocked thither. So many made their appearance that the miniature seminary could not accommodate them all, and soon a larger and more commodious building was erected in the Upper Town, on the same sight the school occupies today.

Madame de la Peltrie threw herself into the work of caring for these little savages with all the enthusiasm of her ardent French nature. She assumed the duty of teaching them the more polite accomplishments, while Mother Marie and the other two women instructed them in the principles of the catechism and the French language. It became her favorite diversion, after spending an hour or two in teaching them to sew, to dress them up like little French children and take them to visit their parents or to the chapel not far distant; and grotesque little objects they were, with tight Norman caps covering their black and glistening locks, and snowy kerchiefs pinned round their tawny throats. They regulated all their actions by hers, and frequently astonished those about them by making an elaborate curtsey like a grand dame of France.

The Poultry Trade.

The quantity of poultry exported from Canada this year will be found, we think, to be in considerable excess of that shipped in any previous year. In quality also it is above the average. While admitting this, it must be said that there is altogether too large a number of what may be termed unfinished birds, more particularly turkeys, coming forward. Farmers will have to learn to feed the birds better, and to begin systematic fattening at an earlier date, in order to be in a position to take advantage of the Christmas market in Great Britain. Canadian exporters have learned that it does not pay to send forward to Europe any goods which are not strictly first-class. Shippers who are not possessed of cold storage facilities for handling birds should especially guard themselves against adverse weather conditions. Those which are killed prematurely without the chance of being stored properly should be left at home rather than shipped at the risk of spoiling the market even for really good stock. Of course it may be possible to have the right temperture after killing and while shipping, but the risk of the contrary happening is very great. The only way to do the work really satisfactorily, year in year out, is to have artificially cool quarters in which to

The point is that, rather than ship poultry of which there is the smallest doubt that it will reach the old country markets in prime quality, shippers would do better, on all accounts, not to ship it at all; it would be better for the shipper himself, and better for the future of the whole trade. One poor consignment will go far towards ruining the reputation of a dozen good shipments.-Monetary Times.
