EDITORIAL NOTES.

Under the British North America Act the Dominion Government has power with the consent of the Imperial Government, to add at any time three or six members to the Senate, representing equally Ontario, Quebec, and the Maritime Provinces. The only limit to this increase is the provision that the number of Senators from Quebec, Ontario, and the Maritime Provinces shall not at any time exceed seventy-eight. 
A Slight Mistake.
