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

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CANADA.

French Canada and the Empire. (J. G. S. Cox, in the November Nineteenth Century.)

Whatever the precise nature of the settlement which must be effected in South Africa after the war, it is at least certain that the two races, Dutch and English, must go on living together side by side. It is interesting, therefore, to remember that a hundred and fifty years ago, in lower Canada, another people, also strangers in blood, passed under the British flag, and that their descendants today are among the most loyal of the subjects of the queen. At the time of the last census 85 per cent of its people were Cacholics, and 80 per cent used French as their mother tongue. At the same time the loyalty of the Catholic province is loyalty with a difference, and that difference is apparent, whether we are considering the relation of Quebec to England, to France, or to the United States. Toward her great neighbor in the south of French Canada has no learning at all. She remembers the fate of Louisiana, and is content.

The difference of attitude toward Great Britain and France goes deeper, and in the future may have important consequences. The things may be put into a phrase by saying that French Cauada is content to be as she is, and wants to leave well alone; while the rest of the seven sister provinces are inclined to look with favor upon any change which tends to tighten the ties of the empire, Quebec views the process with suspicion and distrust. In the eyes of many of her politicians imperial federation threatens to bring with it the doom of French Canada as a separate political entity. At present two millions of French Canadians, under the shelter of treaties guaranteed by Great Britain, can hold their own in a community of five millions; but once merged in a great federation of British states Quebec would disappear, overwhelmed by the surrounding mass of Anglo-Saxondom. By far the greater part of the opposition to the sending of Canadian troops to South Africa was based on this fear that the government was committing itself to the first step toward imperial federation. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in calling upon the whole country to support the action he had taken, showed very clearly his feeling that he had to appeal not to one race but to two. The general situation, then, may be summed up in the fewest words. The people of the French province are loyal to Canada with a passionate loyalty as to the only home they know; they are greatful to Great Britain for her faithful guardianship, and proud of her protection; they look forward neither to the establishment of a great French state on the St. Lawrence nor to annexation to the United States, but they view with deep distrust the prospect of constitutional changes within the empire which may diminish their relative importance and influence as a community.

The Death of Sir Arthur Sullivan.

Sir Arthur Sullivan, who died in London on Thursday of last week, was probably the most widely known and most popular Englishspeaking musical composer of the time. He was born in London in 1842, and was the son of an Irish military bandmaster. He showed at an early age a marked talent for music, and before he was ten years of age it is said he had learned to play with creditable skill every wind instrument in his father's band. He became a choir-boy, studying harmony and composition during his term of service. He afterwards studied in Germany, but was never reconciled to or much influenced by the spirit of the modern German school of music. One of his fellow-students at Leipsic was the Norwegian Edward Grieg -a far greater genius than Sullivan. Grieg's songs will last beyond the time when Sir Arthur's "Lost Chord" is forgotten; but the "Lost Chord" has doubtless been sung twenty-five times while Grieg's "The Old Mother" or his "Young Birch-Tree" has been sung once. written many popular songs, and some church music that has been widely sung-such as his setting of the hymn "Onward, Christian Soldiers," but his fame and popularity rest upon his operettas, of which he brought out successfully more than a dozen. Of these, "Pinafore," which ran for seven hundred nights in England at its first production, had an enormous popular success twenty years ago, and "Patience" and "The Mikado" were almost equally as well liked by the playgoing public. "The Yeomen of the Guard" is undoubtedly his best work musically, as it was the most serious dramatic work of his famous colleague, W. S. Gilbert; it is said to have been the composer's own favorite among his operettas. Oxford and Cambridge both conferred on him the degree of Mus. Doc., and he was undoubtedly the most eminent and most highly honored musician in England. This may fairly be said, without any disparagement of his great gifts, to be an indication of the fact, often noted by students of music, that the Anglo-Saxon has so far developed little genius for the creation of the higher forms of music. Certainly in Germany, and perhaps in France, Russia, and Italy, Sir Arthur, while achieving great popular reputation, would have been ranked by the cognoscenti as a minor composer .--New York Outlook.
