Death of Mr. J. D. Sprague.

The Liverpool, N. S., Advance in referring to the death of Mr. J. D. Sprague, which occurred in that town on August 23rd. has the following to say:

"The intelligence of the sudden death of J. D. Sprague here, Thursday night last, came as a surprise and a shock to the whole community, as Mr. Sprague, though poorly and evidently greatly broken down in health, was yet around the streets and talking with his friends much as usual only the day be-

Deceased was born in Newfoundland, fiftysix years ago. He was the son of a Methodist minister, the late Rev. S. W. Sprague, who came from England early in life and settled in St. John's, Newfoundland. Five brothers and three sisters survive him. One of the brothers Rev. Howard Sprague, D. D., at present serving the Methodist church at Sackville, N. B., another is practising medicine at Woodstock, N. B:, while the other three are doing business in the United States, North West Territories and P. E. I. respectively. The sisters, Mrs. W. S. Drew, of Petite Riviere, and Mrs. L. W. Drew, wife of the efficient Sheriff of Liverpool, N. S.

Mr. Sprague was educated in the Sackville College, N. B. After leaving the college he engaged in the profession of teaching, having taught at Kentville, N. S., for seven years; St. John, N. B., and other places before coming to Liverpool, 1878.

As an educator and teacher, Mr. Sprague had few equals in the province. Teaching was the chosen and beloved profession of his life. To that he was well fitted by natural ability, and qualified by educational training, and to it he devoted his time and all his

The very large concourse that assembled on Saturday last to attend and take part in the impressive services on the occasion of the interment of the remains of the deceased Principal, gave evidence of the esteem in which he was held, and the universal sympathy evoked by his sad and sudden death.


