TEA CAN BE BOUGHT

To Better Advantage in St. John and Halifax than in London.

The question "Do Maritime Province grocers tend to go outside of these provinces to buy Tea?" was discussed by several Nova Scotia traders in the last issue of the Maritime Merchant. Their testimony was that they could buy to better advantage in St. John and Halifax than elsewhere.

Speaking on this question, T. H. Estabrooks, Tea Importer and Blender of the city, said to the Telegraph that since our local wholesalers have gone into the business of importing Teas from the countries of growth, and blending and packing them, the importation of Teas via London has very greatly fallen off and is steadily declining. The direct importer makes a saving in freight and the incidental charges at London, and can sell cheaper; while his knowledge of the requirements of the local market are also greatly to his advantage and that of his customers.

Mr. Estabrooks has for some years devoted his whole attention to the Tea trade, and has a very complete blending and packing plant. His Red Rose Tea has an enormous sale all over the Maritime Provinces.—St. John Telegraph.

Brief Despatches.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—Answering a question in the house today, Mr. Broderick said the authorities of the Congo Free State admitted that British territory about Albert Nyanza had been raided by Congo troops and that women and children had been carried off. The Congo Free State authorities apologized for the raid and sought to punish the invaders.

Geneva, Switzerland, Aug. 6.—When the news of the assassination of King Humbert of Italy was announced to Luchenni, the Italian anarchist who stabbed and killed the Empress of Austria here September 10, 1898, he manifested great joy, saying there was no doubt that before long all the sovereigns would undergo the same fate, commencing with the king of Italy, Luchenni, who is undergoing sentence of imprisonment for life, refused to answer any questions on the subject of the assassination of the king of Italy.

Milan, Aug 6.—Bresci, the assassin of King Humbert, has abandoned the attitude of calm which he had assumed since the murder was committed and has been giving away to fits of passion. This has necessitated placing him in a straight-jacket, for 10 hours.

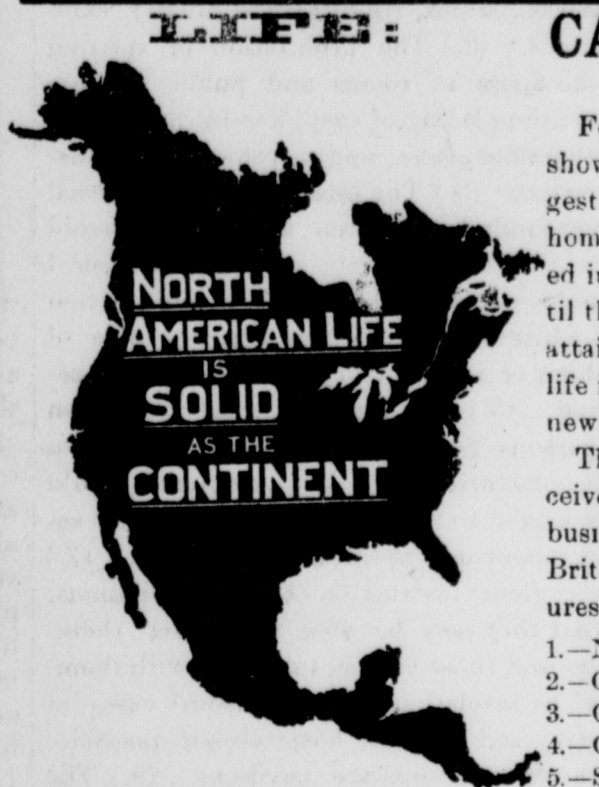
