**A Unique Clock**

Joseph Jenson, a clockmaker of Richfield, Utah, has just completed a remarkable clock which, in addition to striking the hours, half and quarters and showing the phases of the moon, tells just what time it is in every city in the world. This is done by means of a globe which revolves inside a transparent globular glass. On this glass is marked a line which represents 12 o'clock noon. As the globe revolves this line is always over that part of the world in which it is noon at that time. Other lines represent the hours, and in this way it is easy to get the exact time in any given place.

**Uses of Turpentine.**

Turpentine, either in resinous form or in spirits of turpentine, has a lot of household virtues well known to woman on the frontier or in the isolated farmhouses, but not so familiar to city housewives. Few barefoot boys are ignorant that a cut toe heals quickly if some resinous turpentine is used as a salve. But in cities spirits of turpentine can be more easily secured and is more convenient for application. In most cases it will produce the same effect.

Let a child suffering from the croup or from any throat or lung difficulty inhale the vapor, and rub the little sufferer's chest till

the skin is red, ending by wrapping about it a flannel moistened with the fiery spirits. Relief will be almost instantaneous. Afterwards sweet oil will save the skin.

Use spirits of turpentine for burns, the pain will disappear, and healthy granulation at once set in. It can be applied effectively on a linen rag.

Spirits of turpentine will take away the soreness of a blister very quickly. The skin will go down, and healing will begin as soon as the remedy is applied.

But outside of the family medicine chest spirits of turpentine is a good thing to have at hand. It is the best dressing for patent leather, it will clean artists' clothes and workmen's garments from paint, it will drive away moths if a few drops are put into closets and chests, it will persuade mice to find other quarters far away, if a little is poured into the mouseholes, a tablespoonful added to the water in which linens are boiled will make the goods wonderfully white, a few drops will prevent starch from sticking, mixed with beeswax it makes the best floor polish, and mixed with sweet oil it is unrivalled for fine furniture. The latter mixture should be two parts of sweet oil to one of turpentine.

Some physicians recommend spirits of turpentine in external applications for lumbago and rheumatism. It is also prescribed for neuralgia of the face. It is an article that should always be kept about the house.

**Best Way to Wash Gloves.**

A successful wash for soiled kid gloves of the more delicate shades, as well as white, will be owned by many housewives as one of the greatest blessings of the day. Many of the cleaners will say that light grey or pale lavender kids cannot be cleaned successfully, but they are wrong. Go to any drug store, and ask for a cleaning fluid made as follows: Deodorized benzoin, two pints; sulphuric ether, one drachm; chloroform, one drachm; alcohol, two drachms.

Open the windows wide, and have no fire and no light in the room while doing the cleaning. Select a large earthen bowl, and pour in enough of the fluid to well cover the pair of gloves. Wash the gloves just as you would a cloth or a piece of lace. Rub the fingers together until the seams are entirely clean. Use one glove to rub the other with. When they seem to be clean, squeeze out and dry them with a towel sufficiently to put on the hand. If a spot shows anywhere wet it again with the fluid, and rub the kid gently with the towel.

If you have plenty of the washing fluid and are desirous of having the gloves look just like new, rinse them before trying them on in a clean wash. When assured that they are clean, pull them off carefully by loosening the fingers at the tips. Hang them up to dry in the open air. In half an hour all disagreeable odor will have disappeared. One quart of this cleansing fluid will not cost 40 cents, and it ought to clean six pairs of gloves.

**Swinging Hammocks.**

The new swinging hammock—called a hammock coach—is a decided favorite. It is straight like a couch, with the head slightly raised, and is suspended by four ropes from the corners. The hammock comes in duck, are netting or fish mesh, beside in Japanese matting and with or without fringe. The Japanese matting hammocks are particularly attractive. They are ornamental and delightfully cool, as the other materials are for that matter. This hammock is better for sleeping than the ordinary one, though timid women may be of the opinion that a slippery matting hammock would be more comfortable if narrow railing, similar to that at the bottom, were carried around the sides.

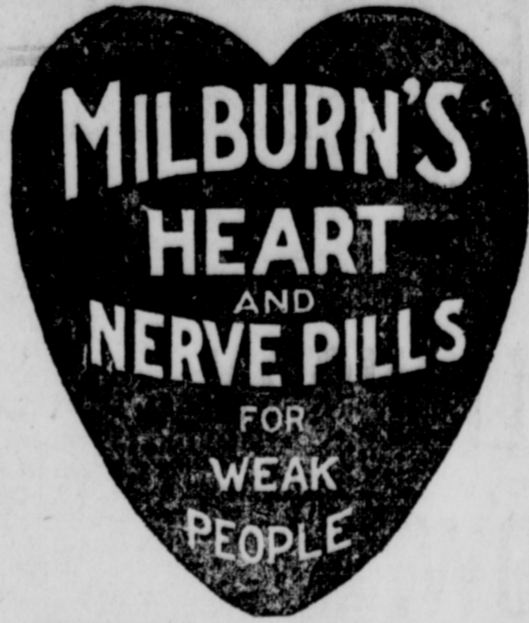

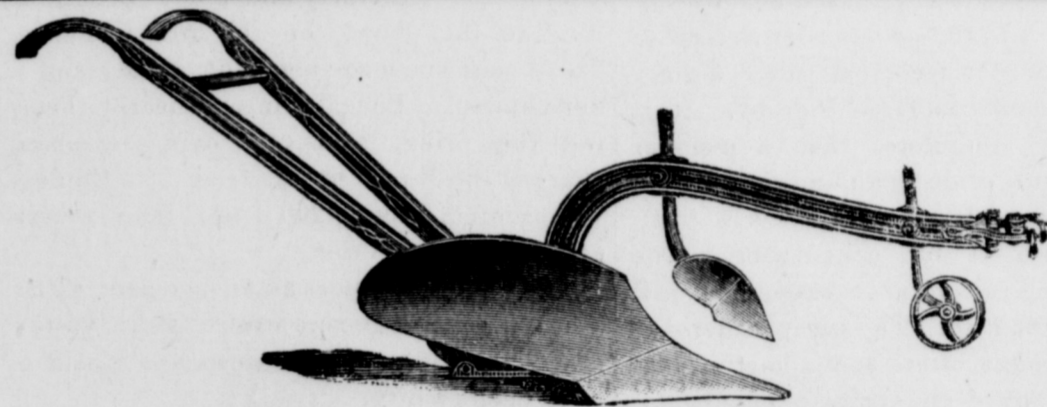
