STRUCK BY A RUNAWAY.

Serious Accident to Miss Sadie Britton of Auburn.

A most serious accident occurred in front of the Free Baptist church, Auburn, Sunday afternoon. As Miss Sadie Britton of Academy street was walking along she was dashed to the pavement by a runaway horse.

The animal was driven by Mr. Ellery DeCoster of East Auburn. He is a young spirited horse, and becoming frightened by the electric car soon was unmanageable. No blame could be attached to Mr. DeCoster.

When the horse veered on the sidewalk Miss Britton was struck in the back and pitched heavily to the pavement. She was rendered unconscious by the force of the fall and was picked up by some of the passers by and taken into the office of Dr. J. W. Beede close by. Dr. Peables came riding by at the same time was called in also, and the two physicians made a careful examination of the young lady's injuries. It was found that she had sustained a severe concussion of the spine and brain and quite possible a slight fracture of the base of the skull.

This is the more dangerous place for a concussion or a fracture than on the top or in front of the head.

The young woman was taken to the residence of her father, Mr. Samuel A. Britton, in the team of Geo. McCann, Esq., of Auburn.

At this writing it is hard to predict the result of her injuries. Blood has flowed from her ears quite freely, which is an unfavorable symptom.

She has partially recovered consciousness so as to be able to recognize her father and other friends at her bedside.

The physicians are holding their judgment in suspension, but hope strongly for the best.

Miss Britton is about 18 years of age, is an accomplished musician and teacher, and has a large circle of friends to whom her sad accident will come as a heavy shock.—Lewiston Sun.

In the three refrigerators which Mr. Troy has put in he keeps large supplies of all sorts of temperance drinks wherewith to quench the thirst of the weary traveller. The appointments of the restaurant are most convenient. A full hotel dinner can be rushed in to a man who is in a hurry in the short space of one minute and twenty seconds. Communication by electric bells exists from and to all parts of the building. For the Summer trade Mr. Troy has made ample provision. Lambs Tongue, Pigs feet and other cold meats he is constantly receiving. Ice cream is a specialty just now. This he not only serves to his customers but can supply in any quantity at any time. He can put up lunches for picnic parties at shortest notice. This restaurant has long been well known for the public dinners and suppers it serves and under Mr. Troy's management it has improved in this line as well as in others. Mr. Troy receives a large consignment of all kinds of fruit from the Boston market every week.

ST. PAUL'S Presbyterian church Woodstock has been improved very much in the last month or two. The walls have papered and the woodwork painted, and new and more comfortable seats have been put in. The ladies of the church deserve special credit for their interest in these improvements.

Trade Enquiries.

The following were among the enquiries relating to Canadian trade received at the High Commissioner's office in London, during the week ending 25th May:—

1. The address of Canadian manufacturers of round wood dowels are asked for by a London importer.

2. A London paper agent who has had experience in handling the product of Canadian mills desires to get into communication with manufacturers in the Dominion who desire to open up an export trade.

3. Enquiry has been received respecting copper deposits in Canada which have not yet been worked to any extent.

4. Information is desired regarding firms engaged on a large scale in quarrying sandstone in Canada.

5. A merchant in the North of England, who can place exporters of canned apples, tomatoes, lobsters, etc., in communication with large distributors of such foods, will be glad to hear from Canadian firms doing business in those lines.

The following enquiries have been received by Mr. Harrison Watson, Canadian section Imperial Institute:—

1. A Liverpool house desires names of Canadian importers of tallows, grease, etc.

2. A house in Malta wishes to be placed in touch with Canadian shippers of ham, and bacon, cheese, and produce.

3. A French correspondent who represents English firms, calls attention to the considerable quantity of "Pomme Arival" (chopped apple) imported from the United States, and would be pleased to hear from Canadian producers who may be inclined to take the matter up.

4. Another enquiry has been received from a London importer wishing to obtain supplies of Canadian wood dowels.

5. There are two enquiries for addresses of Canadian importers of cattle hoofs, bones, etc.
