NEW MARSHALL APPOINTED.

His Worship Gives his Casting Vote in Favor of James Harvey.

The council chamber was well filled on Friday evening, as it was thought there might be interesting scenes over the appointment of the new town marshal. It will be remembered at Monday's meeting the councilors were divided as to the merits of James Harvey and Henry Ingraham for the office, and that the mayor asked until Friday evening to throw his casting vote.

After the usual preliminaries, the mayor recited the circumstances leading to the somewhat extraordinary procedure adopted by the council at the previous meeting, and then said: It becomes my duty to give the casting vote on the amendment, to the effect that Henry B. Ingraham be marshal, and I declare the amendment lost.

Coun. Dibblee—Another amendment is in order, and I move that Thos. McCarron be appointed town marshal.

Coun. Gallagher seconded the motion.

The Mayor—I refuse to entertain that amendment. Mr. McCarron is now an officer of the town and is not qualified. Those in favour of the motion that James H. Harvey be appointed town marshal will manifest it by saying yea.

Couns. Graham, Jones and Carr stood up when question was called, and the mayor declared the motion carried.

After some discussion the marshal was instructed to find bonds to the extent of \$1000. He was also appointed poor commissioner at a salary of \$75 00 a year. (The salary as marshal is \$375, a year.)

H. N. Payson was appointed pound keeper, etc.

On motion of Coun. Gallagher the following license fees for shows was adopted, for 1 night \$5.00; 2 nights \$6 00; 3 nights \$7.50; 6 nights \$12.00.

Coun. Graham protested against this, and claimed that the former licence \$2.50 a night all around was quite sufficient, but the council did not agree with him.

The by-law regarding workmen from outside the town paying licence was ordered enforced, and by a strange inconsistency, residents in Grafton and Upper Woodstock are excepted from the working of the by-law, while residents at the turn below town come under the law.

The by-law forbidding people to ride bicycles on the sidewalks was referred to, and on motion of Coun. Lindsay, the marshal was instructed to lay information against the first person he sees riding a wheel on the sidewalk. It is to be hoped that any of the councillors who ride wheels will not be hoisted with their own petard.

Coun. Carr raised the question of the appointment of a Scott Act Inspector for the town, but the mayor displayed no sympathy to the motion, claiming that, at present, the town had an inspector, that there was no right to appoint another, and that if there were, the experience, before, when there were two inspectors was not one worth following. Nobody else had anything to say in the matter and it dropped.

The Andover Creamery

The Andover Creamery is doing a good business. There are now sixty five (65) men sending in milk and several more will be sending as soon as they can get the cans. At the present time Mr. Manzer is receiving daily in the vicinity of 6000 lbs of milk. When the can supply increases he will be getting about 8000 lbs. of milk a day. This means a daily output of 360 lbs. of butter a day. The butter is being put up for export trade. It will be shipped to Montreal every two weeks. In a large measure the success of this factory is due to the untiring efforts of J. Frank Tilley, dairy superintendent of St. John River Counties. On the second day of running the separator, a test of the skimmed milk showed only 3.100 of 1 % of butter fat left in the milk and then the machine was running 700 lbs. above her rated capacity. On the third day, when running 200 lbs. per hour above her rated capacity the skimmed milk on test showed a presence of only 1.100 of 1 % of butter fat left. This is the finest skimming possible with any separator known to expert butter makers. The factory is making 4 1/2 lbs. of butter from 100 lbs. of milk. The price paid at the Andover Creamery for butter fat is 16 cts per lb. This is the same price as that paid by the Carleton Creamery Company. The plant for the Andover Creamery, including the Sharples Tubular separator, No. 25, a 400 gallon Key City Churn, a Mason Power butter worker, vats and other necessities, were supplied by Mr. Stauley Sutton of Andover.

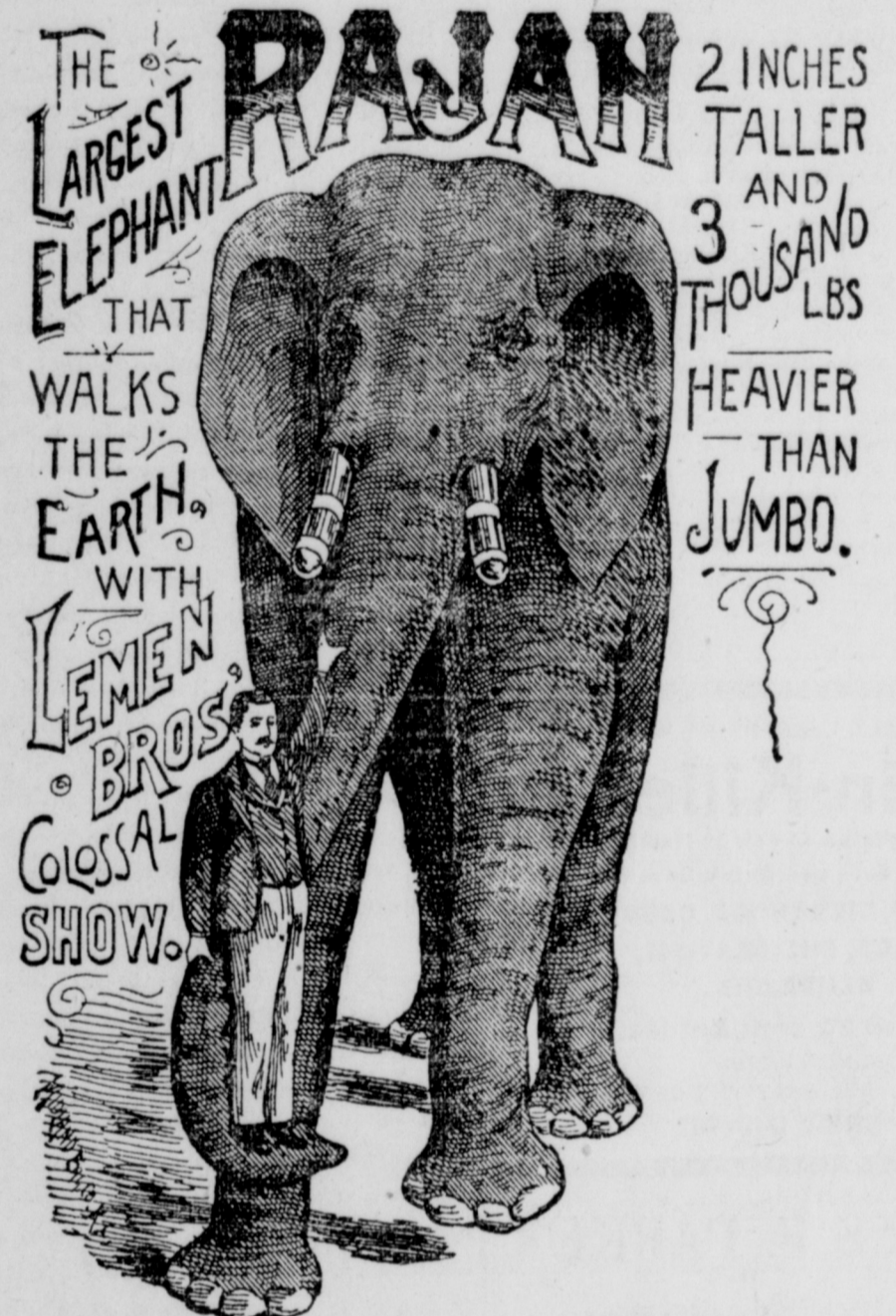
