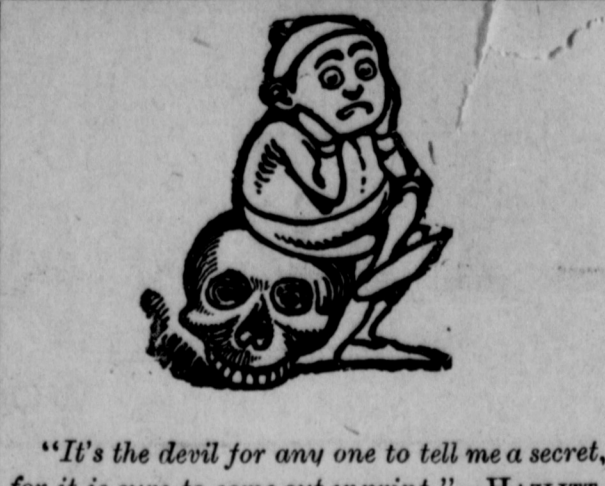

"It's the devil for any one to tell me a secret, for it is sure to come out in print."—HAZLITT.

It is often said that an intoxicated man will pass through dangers which prove the ruin of those who indulge in sobriety, and the following incident reported from an Ontario town would seem to bear out the truth of this commonly accepted dictum:—"While the patrol waggon was conveying a drunk to the police station the horses bolted and ran away at full speed. After crossing the C. P. R. tracks they ran into a pole which supports the trolley, smashing the pole in half a dozen pieces. The horses broke away from the wrecked waggon and finished their spin by returning to the station with the broken harness dangling behind them. The driver was severely bruised in the collision with the post, and the other policemen in the waggon were thrown out and badly shaken up. The drunk sat through it all unharmed." I would not advise any one to go off and get drunk, in order that he might escape danger, even in the face of the above reported incident. If this drunk has reason to think he would have been seriously injured, had he remained sober, how many are there who would be living today, if they had steered clear of the bewitching bottle.

It is evident that the town authorities have a right to look after the cleaning off the sidewalks, unless, at all events, there is a by-law making some special provision, whereby citizens shall attend to this duty themselves. And, if a council, can force citizens to clean off sidewalks it can also force them to keep the main road clean. Our street commissioner does pretty well considering, and it has not been found necessary yet for a judge to address town authorities on the subject. In London, Ont., the other day, Judge Meredith in addressing the grand jury, said it was the duty of that body to bring to the notice of the authorities all matters of public interest. The principle count against the Woodstock sidewalks is the slipperiness, thereof.
