CARLETON COUNTY INSURANCE

Is Not Recommended Favorably by the Corporations Committee.

FREDERICTON, March 24.—The corporations committee met this morning and recommended, with slight amendments, the Carleton and Miramichi railway act. This is an act by which several lumber operators in Carleton County and on the Miramichi want incorporation for the purpose of constructing a branch railway through their extensive lumber lands from Bristol, Carleton county, to Cross Creek, on the Canada Eastern Railway, near Stanley. It is understood that only 15 miles, from Bristol to Preston, would be built at first.

The bill to incorporate the Coverdale Log Driving Company was discussed, but did not receive the recommendation of the committee.

The Carleton County Co-operative Fire Association are seeking incorporation. Their bill was before the corporations committee some days ago. As the principle of the bill was thought to be somewhat absurd it was handed back to the promoters for reconsideration. It was again before the committee today and referred back to the house.

By the bill the association named above wish to band together for the purpose of mutual insurance, on the assessment plan, against fire. The bill provides that every person become a member of the association had to deposit his note for such an amount as he was insured for and to make a payment immediately of one-fifth per cent of the note and the remainder is to be made payable in whole, or part at any time the directors should deem requisite for the payment of losses or other expenses.

Every member of the association is, according to this bill, obliged to pay his share of all losses and expenses only to the extent of his note.

The association were to have a lien on all buildings insured, together with the interest of the assured on the lands upon which the buildings were situated.

The committee thought the scheme a visionary one and that while it might work in case of single fires, in the event of a big conflagration the association would go to pieces. Some members of the committee thought the association if established should confine its work to Carleton County and let the business men of that locality take their chances on it. It would be dangerous to have the company loose on the territory outside of that county.
