CARLETON COUNTY QUOTA

Leaves Woodstock Amid a Burst of Patriotic Enthusiasm.

Hockey Games in Victoria Rink Have Commenced—Declaration at the Court House.—Mayor and Town Councillors Elected by Acclamation.

The Carleton County quota of the second Canadian contingent for service in South Africa left Woodstock on Monday afternoon amid a public demonstration in their honour such as Woodstock has never seen before. Following is the list of the men who left.

The procession formed up on Queen Street at one o'clock in the afternoon, in this order: The committee appointed by a meeting of citizens to give the quota a good send off, composed of Col. Dibblee, H. P. Baird, Mayor Murphy, T. C. L. Ketchum, J. T. A. Dibblee and J. C. Hartley.

Next came the 67th Batt. Band in uniform. The Queen's colours.

The Carleton County quota of the contingent headed by Capt. Good.

The regimental colours of the 67th Batt. presented to them by the late Hon. Charles Connell, borne by the son of Col. Baird.

Then came citizens on foot, and in sleighs making a long and enthusiastic procession. The whole body moved up Regent Street to the Armory and thence to Main Street. The sidewalks were thronged with ladies and gentlemen, waving handkerchiefs, flags and walking sticks and shouting good wishes to the soldiers.

At the lower station where the men embarked, Capt. Good formed his men up in squad and Col. Dibblee first presented Capt. Good and the men with \$105.00 in gold on behalf of the lessees of the Roller Rink, being the proceeds of the benefit night given in the Rink in their honour. Then on behalf of the citizens he presented Capt. Good with a draft on Halifax for \$200, the result of the banquet and concert given in honour of the quota in the Opera House a short time ago. The amount, which included the \$25 00 telegraphed by G. M. Frupp, was to be used by Capt. Good for the men in any way that seemed right to him. Col. Dibblee then wished the men God Speed and Capt. Good replied in a few words. The men boarded the train amid shouts and cheers, the music of the bands, the tears of their relatives and friends, and the train pulled out. The gathering at the station was the largest ever seen in Woodstock and it will be long before so large a crowd will be seen again.

THE WAR.

War news from South Africa is scarce and generally not very reliable. A London despatch of Monday the 15th reports that Gen. Warren has crossed the Tugela River and now occupies a strong position on the north bank, but the report is not confirmed by the war office.

A despatch from Orange River dated January 12th says.—

Gen. Wood, for the first time in this campaign, has established a post in the enemy's country. With a force of all arms he took up a position January 6th at Zeoutspans drift, on the north side of the Orange River, in the Free State.

OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been advised that the Imperial authorities have accepted Lord Strathcona's offer of 400 mounted men to be raised in the Canadian Northwest and British Columbia to go to the Transvaal war.

Town Elections.

Monday was the day for the election of a Mayor and Councillors for the Town of Woodstock but no election was needed. The requisite six men for councillors walked over the course without opposition. They were J. T. Allen Dibblee, James Carr, H. E. Gallagher, A. E. Jones, John A. Lindsay and John Graham. Although Mayor Murphy

and W. B. Belyea had both been nominated for the mayoralty, something was out of order with Mr. Belyea's nomination paper and Mr. Murphy has the office again without a contest.

Declaration.

The election on Friday last of a member to fill the place in the General Assembly of the Province, rendered vacant by the resignation of Charles L. Smith, resulted in the defeat of Frank R. Shaw, the government candidate, and the election of J. K. Flemming, the opposition candidate. Here is the result as announced by the sheriff at declaration:

FRED YERXA KILLED

In the C. P. R. Yard at Woodstock on Saturday.

Large Reception for A. S. Burchill of the Merchants' Bank, who has Gone to British Columbia.

Fred Yerxa, a well known and popular brakeman of the C. P. R. met with an accident in the Woodstock yard on Saturday so serious that it proved fatal. He was working in the yard, helping to make up the Hobo train. Louis Parker was in the engine backing up and hauling some cars out of the siding just back of Connell's foundry. Mr. Yerxa was standing on the cow catcher when he fell off, falling partly on the track and the cars in front of the engine went over his legs. Both legs were horribly crushed. He was taken to his home and Drs. Saunders, Kierstead and Hand called in. They could only dress the wounds, his condition being too serious to warrant an amputation. He died early Sunday morning. He leaves a widow, who is a daughter of William Bagley, and one child.

A large number of gentlemen met Mr. A. S. Burchill, late Manager of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax here, in the upper hall of the Carlisle Hotel on Friday night of last week, to say good bye to him before his departure to British Columbia, to which province his promotion in the bank takes him.
