



Continued from 7th Page.

Coun. Gillmore spoke of the unfair canvasses against those who advocated the new gaol. His people voted for him knowing he favored the new gaol.

Couns. Atkinson and Cheney spoke in favor of the motion.

The resolution was carried by a large ma-

Yeas -Couns. Caldwell, Tracey, Atkinson, Shaw, Forrest, Cheney, Carvell, Kearney, Foster, Bell (Wakefield), Phillips (Brighton), Phillips (Peel), Phillips (Northampton), Bell (Richmond), Hay (Richmond), Lamont, Nays-Speer, Tompkins, Balmain, Saunders Gillmere and Bailey.

Coun. Phillips (Brighton) moved:

Coun. Carvell moved that a committee be appointed to consult with I. B. Curtis with regard to a settlement of the equity suit instituted by him. }

Coun. Forrest agreed with this, and the resolution was adopted. Couns. Caldwell, Atkinson and Carvell were named such a committee.

Money for poor purposes was ordered paid on order of councillors or collectors for the commissioners.

On motion of Coun Saunders it was decided to appoint a committee to confer with the sec. treas. and auditor with regard to the amount to be assessed this year. Couns Saunders, Shaw and Tompkins were named that committee.

The committee on the gaol matter submitted this report that Curtis offer to withdraw the suit upon the municipality paying him \$250, and assuming all liability on the injunc tion to all persons whatsoever.

Coun Saunders did not approve of paying Curtis \$280.

The following communication was read from Sunbury County council:-WHERELS, and also by Act of Assembly 61 Vic. (1898) cap. 33, sec. 70, large sums of money are caused to be annually assessed upon and paid by the municipalities of this province which were not before the passing of the said several acts of assembly paid out of the said municipal funds. And, whereas by the said acts of assembly all discretionary power as to the amounts so to be assessed and paid is taken away from the county councils.

THEREEORE RESOLVED that a committee be appointed to take such steps as may be necessary by petition or otherwise to lay the matter before the legislature at the next session thereof, with a view of having the said acts repealed, which committee shall have full power to carry out the will of the council as therein expressed. AND FURTHER RESOLVED that the secre-

tary treasurer be instructed forthwith, to transmit a copy of this resolution duly certi fied, to the secretary treasurer of every municipality in this province and unite their co-operation in the matter.

After dinner the council went into committee of the whole on the county accounts. Among those were Michael Kelly's account \$81.57. It was decided to pay the bill less the interest, \$6 00. P. McCanna's bill was \$1252.65, for his work and loss in connection with the new gaol started in town.

Mr. McCanna said that there was the stock, brick, stone, etc., on the ground which being valued would reduce the bill to about \$900. If the council paid him that bill and \$1000 extra he would not go through all that he went through. He had 17 men to work, three double teams when he got that notice to stop.

Coun. Carvell-Did you pay out any cash since this injunction?

Coun. Cheney-We are willing to pay Mr. McCanna what is right, but he is asking us \$463.34 for 60 days.

Coun. Forrest moved that a committee of five confer with Mr. McCanna on this question. This was carried.

When the council resumed the following committee was appointed to confer with Mc-Canna regarding his bill, the report of the committee as the whole being adopted, Couns. Caldwell, Tracey, Atkinson, Forrest, Phillips (Brighton).

Coun. Saunders reported on amount to be assessed for the incoming year. The committee recommended that \$7000 be assessed upon the county for county purposes, with Continued on 2nd Page.
