The Bursting Shell.
"A common shell for a field gun is in
shape and size very like an ordinary pint-
bottle; the head, however, is dome-shaped,
so that if the neck of the bottle be knocked
off, the similarity is greater. The metal of
the shell may be either cast-iron or steel. If
the former is used, there is less room for
powder, because the weakness of the cast-
iron necessitates thicker sides to the shell
than if it were made of steel. Cast-iron,
however, breaks up well. What is required
in a shell is that it should stand a heavy
pressure from outside safely, and yet burst
readily into a large number of pieces."

"When a shell bursts the action is by no
means instantaneous. After the ignition of
the fuse the bursting charge of the shell
takes some little time to develop sufficient
pressure to burst the shell. This is owing to
the comparatively deliberate way in which
gun powder behaves on being ignited. There
are many explosives that detonate in one-
millionth of a second or thereabouts, but a
shell charged with gunpowder will take one
five thousandths of a second to burst. The
time does not appear long; and if the shell
be travelling at 1,000 foot-seconds, it will
have moved five feet from the point of im-
pact before it bursts. If the velocity be as
much as 2,000 foot-seconds, the shell will
not burst until it has gone ten feet from the
point of impact."

"The bursting of a shell will not in itself
drive the fragments very far or very fast.
The injuries caused by the pieces of a shell
are mainly due to the velocity with which it
was travelling before it burst. Thus a 'spen-'
shell from a field-gun bursting on the surface
though it throws a good many fragments
along the ground, and only the large pieces
are likely to cause serious wounds. Larger
shells are more formidable in this respect,
but mainly because the fragments are larger;
they do not travel with much more velocity
than those from a small shell."

part and parcel of her martial force. Now it
is recognized that in Canada and Australia
she has a broad and fertile recruiting ground
from which she can draw soldiers of the finest
quality, equal in effectiveness to the best re-
giments in her service. This practically adds
one-fourth to the population from which the
empire can raise British soldiers, lifting it at
a bound from 40,000,000 to 50,000,000. And
it must be remembered that the Canadian
and Australian contingents were offered at a
time when the war wore an aspect very dif-
ferent from its present appearance. The
colonists came forward to assist the mother
country in a time of defeat and disaster when
it looked as if enlistment in the British army
would too probably mean death in a lost
battle or imprisonment for an indefinite term
at Pretoria. Yet, in spite of this gloomy
prospect, the gallant colonists rallied to the
flag, and the more the outlook darkened, the
hotter they were for a chance to meet the
enemy.

Another point which counts with equal
force as a strengthening factor is the loyalty
shown by the martial races of India. The
British war office has not availed itself of the
tenders of service from the dark-skinned
subjects of the crown either in Asia or in
Africa, but there can be no question that if
it had disregarded the color line, as we did
in the United States during the civil war, the
empire could have raised, literally by the
hundred thousand, dusky soldiers who would
have rejoiced to fight for the Queen, and
would have met the burghers with a courage
equal to their own.—Boston Herald.

The Religious Editor has no use for indis-
criminate discussions of politics or religion.
People never convince each other in these
unseemly squabbles and the only result of
them is that some one gets his feelings hurt
needlessly. What good does it do to tell a

when you know he won't believe you? What
good does it do to tell a man that his relig-
ious theories are away off? It doesn't do a
bit of good. "No!" says the Religious

much more civilized and christian amusement.

relieve his friend of his loose change and
that I'm sure, is not so unchristian as to hurt
his feelings." It may be that the Religious
Editor is correct, but still, I never play
poker. I don't think it is right, and beside,
I always lose my money in it. Still, I
think these squabbles about politics and re-
ligion are useless.

It is related amongst the wonderful cures

take the palm. Fear, it would appear is
about unknown to them. This business of
absolute recklessness on the part of the British
officers does not strike me as really much
good. It is said "Oh! our officers must set a
good example to the men." Well, this may
do some when the officer is away up in
security, and Tommy is from the slums, but
with colonial troops, it is not at all rare to
find the private far better connected than
the officer. Fancy, some your Sussex officers
for instance, giving out that they would need
to expose their precious bodies, in order to
set a good example to the men. There is no
doubt that many officers were killed, quite
unnecessarily in the late war. It seems that
the first real action which the Canadians had,
was useless. An old country officer com-
manding the corps with the Canadians, re-
marked that they were not advancing fast
enough. Col. Otter said they were, in his
opinion, but the English officer's opinion
prevailed. A lot of Canadians were killed
and wounded for no purpose. It does not
require a graduate of Kingston to see that a
live man is worth more to his country than a
dead man. There is too much desire for in-
dividual glory, "setting the terrible reputa-
tion ever at the cannon's mouth. The great
thing is to win the victories and put an end
to the war, for no one but a fool, with a
brain that no bullet could injure, can think
that war is anything but awful, necessary
at times, but certainly, awful.
