PLANNED ON THE VOYAGE.

How Roberts and Kitchener Thought Out the Campaign.

The conditions under which the new campaign was planned in South Africa by Gen. Roberts and Gen. Kitchener on the voyag to the Cape are described in a letter from an officer on Gen. Kelly-Kenny's staff, which I have seen. This officer had anticipated seeing something of the two famous generals on the ship, but was disappointed. Gen. Roberts appeared on deck at 6 o'clock every morning and walked up and down briskly for two hours. Promptly at 8 o'clock he turned to his chief of staff with an abrupt call. Gen. Kitchener, alert in response, "Here, sir," was always on hand, and the next moment the conqueror of Kandahar and the conqueror of Omdurman would disappear from the deck and not be seen again until the next morning at the same early hour.

A large cabin had been reserved for Gen. Roberts' use, and there he remained busy day after day with his chief of staff until midnight, with no interruption except at short intervals for meals, and no visitors, unless members of his staff were summoned.

A short stroll on deck at midnight capped the day's work, and the two generals then turned in.

This order was followed day after day until the ship anchored at Cape Town, and the campaign, which had been throughly discussed and thought out in detail, was opened .-New York Tribune.

Estey & Curtis, Hartland. The Car Inspector.

It is interesting to watch the trained car asp-ctor examining a long freight train which has rolled into the yards. He moves along the side of the cars and notes all the wheels, brake beams, bolsters, rods, etc. He uses no hammer, but has his eyes open for defects. He will stop suddenly, look care fully at a wheel and follow the faint lines of a crack running, perhaps, from the flange to the centre. Such a wheel is condemned a once and the car is shunted off until a new pair of wheels can be placed under it. If there is a flat place on a wheel which meas ures more than two and a half inches across, that wheel must go too. Then there may be a sharp flange and that must be looked after. A coupling may have faults. A brake rig ging may have given out, and all these things the inspector must note.

He must be an honest man, as thousands of dollars worth of property and many lives might be sacrificed in case he neglected some thing. Box-car doors he looks at carefully. They are dangerous things if they are loose. Many an engineer of fireman has met his doom by having the cab strike a loose car door. It may be hanging in place in the yard, but when it reaches a point where a strong wind catches it, out it goes, and the passing train catches it. In such cases there is a shower of splinters, a broken cab, and it is lucky indeed if there is no one killed. Engineers have a dread of loose doors, and are always glad when a freight train is past them when they are running at full speed. Another thing the inspector must watch is the hopper-bottom dump car. If the fastening gets loose and lets a load of ore or limestone down on the track while the train is in motion it means a bad wreck.
