New Way in Which France Will Begin the Afternoon.

A new method of counting time has gone into effect in all departments of the Government of France, and the hours are now officially reckoned in that country from 1 to 24. The old system of dividing days into two s disappointing to learn that all our periods of 12 hours each has been abolished, to the Canadian contingent are not and hereafter all Government documents will be dated according to the new order of things The change was not made through a Legis lative enactment, but was decreed by the bureau of longitudes after assuring itself of the support of the Ministry. It received the sanction of the Government because it is believed it will make the reckoning of time more simple and will save many mistakes to the public that arose out of the double period system.

> Under the old method it was necessary to qualify an hour with antemeridian or post meridian, as the case might be, to insure accuracy. The failure to do this opened a way for many mistakes that in commercial affairs proved very costly. Under the new system it is only necessary in order to make a definite idea of time to give the day and hour Antemeridian and post meridian are not necessary factors in reckoning time because there is no longer a division of the day ac-

Under the new system a day begins at midnight. What is 1 o'clock in the afternoon under the old method is 13 o'clock under the



To Secure a Constant Egg Yield.

The hardest task in maintaining a constant and continuous egg yield is to keep the laying stock in prime condition. This means such a condition of perfect health that the eggs will not only be laid regularly, but that they will be of uniform size, according to the breed laying them. Under such conditions we should have large eggs from Minorcas, Leghorns, Plymouth Rocks and Brahmas. When such breeds lay small eggs, abnormally large eggs with perhaps double yolks or soft shelled eggs, the stock is out of condition ^{14.} Don't keep him in the kettle ^{15.} he will stay there himself if ^{16.} is taken. 
