HAVE THE KHAKI FEVER.

Stinging Rebuke to the Smart Women in  
Africa.

NEW YORK, April 30.—Frederick Treves,  
a famous surgeon, who has just returned  
from the war, was entertained together with  
Sir William MacCormac, at a banquet at the  
Reform Club on Saturday night, presided  
over by Lord Rosebery, says a London cable.  
Mr. Treves took occasion to administer a  
stinging rebuke to the "smart" women suffer-  
ing from khaki fever who have gone as alleged  
nurses to the front.

He said:—"So far as the sick are concern-  
ed, there are only two plagues in South  
Africa—the plague of flies and the plague of  
women. The flies we get rid of by horsehair  
wigs and other appliances, and the flies at  
least depart at night. But the women are  
absolutely and really a terror. They came  
out in the guise of amateur nurses after hav-  
ing exhausted every other form of excite-  
ment. Considering that we are engaged in a  
war, the number of well-dressed ladies at  
Cape Town and elsewhere giving picnics is a  
blot on the campaign."

This onslaught on the latest fad of smart  
society electrified the audience, and is certain  
to provoke bitter recriminations.
