Perished In Burning House EDMUNDSTON, N. B., April 22 .- A sad and fatal accident occurred here this afternoon by which William Douston lost his three year old son and his dwelling house. Douston lived in a small house on the east side of the Madawaska river here, near the Temiscouata railway bridge, and at half-past two this afternoon the house was seen to be on fire. When noticed the fire had gained such head. way that nothing could be done towards saving the building. The child was upstairs a lone at the time, and, although every possible effort was made by those who first arrived to save him, the boy, who was about three years old, perished in the flames. Mrs. Douston was in the lower part of the house, but did not notice the fire until too late to save even the child. The remains of the boy were found in the ruins badly charred and burned, except his face and the upper part of the trunk, which were little marked. It is believed that the fire was started by the child in some way. There was no insurance.-Globe.
