IN SLAVERY'S DAYS

An Advertisement Which Sounds Strange in These Days.

St. John Paper of Over a Hundred Years Ago.-A Runaway Boy Wanted Home.-Sudden Death of a Northampton Lady Living in Bangor.

Some weeks ago the DISPATCH noticed a copy of the St. John Gazette and Advertiser, dated of the year 1795. Since then Dr. Owens of Millville has sent us a copy of The Royal Gazette and New Brunswick Advertiser of July 2, 1799, vol XIX No. 685. Although there is a slight change in the name, this is evidently a direct successor to the Gazette of 1795, before noted. It is printed by John Ryan.

One of the first advertisements noticed is Assice of Bread.

Established June 14, 1799.

The sixpenny wheaten loaf to weigh 1 lb. 10 oz., ditto rye 2 lbs. 14 oz. This is signed by Wm. Campbell, mayor.

There is a proclamation by His Excellency Thomas Carleton, Esq, containing notice of a further prorogation of the legislative. But here is the startling announcement:

To Be Sold A Negro Man, about 20 years of age-is short, but well made and very active. Can do all sorts of farming work and is a handy house servant. For terms etc enquire of Mr. Ryan,

Saint John, 11th June, 1799.

About a hundred years ago that advertisement was entered. We shrug our shoulders in horror. This negro had no rights. We are improving slowly. He has rights, now, but we give them rather grudgingly, and at election times we try to buy both white man and negro. Here is another advertisement Ten Shillings Reward.

Runaway from the subscriber living in the parish of Prince William and county of York -an indented Apprentice Lord named William McKain near twenty years of ago. Whoever will take up said apprentice and bring him to his master, shall be entitled to the above reward.

Distribution of Samples of Seed Grain.

Editor of The Dispatch:-

Dear Sir,-Under instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture another distribution of sample packages of the best and most productive sorts of cereals, etc. is now being made from the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. The distribution will consist, as heretofore, of samples of oats, spring wheat, barley, field peas, Indian corn and potatoes. Each sample will weigh three pounds. The quality of the seed will be of the best, the varieties true to name and the packages will be sent free to applicants, through the mail. The object in view is the improvement of the character and quality of the grain, etc. grown in Canada, an effort widely appreciated, and the choice of varieties to be sent out will be confined to those which have been found to succeed well at the Experimental Farms.

These samples will be sent only to those who apply personally, lists of names from societies or individuals cannot be considered. Only one sample of one sort can be sent to each applicant, hence if an individual receives a sample of oats he cannot also receive one of bailey or wheat. Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa, and may be sent any time before the 15th of March, after which date Woodstock, N. Latest War News.

A story is told in the Birmingham Daily Mail of the departure of one of the reservists for the front, showing the sublime confidence which a British soldier's wife has in the prowess of her spouse. As her husband left in the train from Snow Hill station, a woman was seen weeping, bitterly. Full of sympathy a bystander tried to speak words of comfort to the grief stricken wife, when he was met with the following answer: "Oh, it ain't 'im I'm troublin about, it's them poor Boers I'm thinkin' of, Bili's such a terror when 'e starts." So saying, the woman started off home, shuddering at the dire fate that awaited the enemy in South Africa.

The journal says it is impossible to give the residents of these rebel constituencies the benefit of the doubt that possibly their renunciation of allegiances is contrary to their desire. The present outbreak of wanton and unprovoked disloyalty cannot be washed out with rose-water. Among the invalids pro ceeding home in the next hospital ship is Private James Williamson, of the Black Watch, a native of Montrose. He was struck by six bullets at Magersfontein. One bullet hit a testiment which was in his breast pocket over the heart. The ball glanced off the testament and passed through his left arm which it broke. He thus owes his life to the possession of a copy of the Scriptures. Williamson was shot through the left foot, left thigh, right shoulder, right leg, and back.

Dr. Lyds says:-"All this talk about peace is sadly premature. Great Britain surely will not succumb now. Neither will we. While we are talking here, it may be that a decisive battle is being fought there, for l presume Lord Roberts has withdrawn the troops from around Ladysmith and is massing them for a formidable coup.'

The further purposes of the war office are supposed to embrace somewhere in the neighborhood of 50,000 more men. As the indication is that candidates will be rather carce, the war office will issue orders for those reservists who were found unfit at the previous mobilization examinations to report for further examination.

Gen. Buller's operation has cost 912 men, so far as officially reported, within ten days Applying to the 206 Spion Kop casualities reported today the rule of proporti u, the losses of officers indicate probably 500 casualities yet to come. The total casualities of the war, compiled from official reports are 9,723, nearly a division. Of these, 2,485 are killed, 4811 wounded and the rest prisoners.

The aggregate British home troops in South Africa number 19,000, the Natalians 7,158 and the Cape Calonians 21,000.

Sent Up For Trial.

Ward Prior, of Centreville, was on trial in the police court this morning, charged with having assaulted the wife of Dr. Brown of the same place. The complainent stated that he held a knife over her and told her to keep quiet or he would kill her. The prisoner was sent up for trial.

Small Pox Spreading.

NEWCASTLE, Jan. 29 -Mr. E. Lee Street. chairman of the Newcastle Board of Health, received a telegram from Bathurst this morn ing stating that the doctors in that town had lost control of the small pox and that it was spreading rapidly. The number of cases in Bathurst is not as yet known, but it is beheved there has been a great increase since Saturday.

Illness of Mrs. A. G. Blair.

Mrs. Blair, wife of the Hon., the Minister of Railways and Canals, is dangerously ill with pneumonia. The recent death of her son was a great shock to Mrs. Blair. It was feared on Saturday that recovery was impossible but later news is more cheerful.

WARNING TO SMALL BOYS

Who Coast Dangerous Hills Without Looking Ahead.

Young Fawcett Smashes into Jarvis Bedell's Team .- A New Industry Which Promises to be Successful and of Great Benefit to This County.

Boys who slide down hills crossing the main streets of the town would do well totake warning from the accident which befell young Freddie Fawcett on Saturday morning last. He was coasting down the hill running from the mountain cottage, and a board fence obscured the street at right angles. Jarvis Bedell came along, and young Fawcett went full pelt into his sled. He was knocked unconscious. Dr. Saunders came to his relieff as soon as possible. It was rumoured that the boy was fatally injured, but the doctors now announces that he is doing well and barring complications will recover. Young Fawcett is about 12 years of age. The small boy will coast, and no one wants to stop him, but he should be warned not to coast in dangerous places. A Coming Industry.

There has been a good deal of talk at Board of Trade meetings and among citizens, generally, of the need of a furniture factory. It is proclaimed a crying shame that with our advantages for this sort of work, and with all our natural facilities, furniture should be introduced by the car load from Ontario, and sold right here in the midst of a wood producing country.

Alex. Henderson, who for so many years conducted a furniture factory at Upper Woodstock has long had in his mind the idea of repeating the experiment on a basis to make it a profitable industry. He is now beginning the work in the factory on Upper Main St. formerly occupied by Chestnut & Hipwell. To begin with, he has secured cheap power, in a windmill bought from an Upper Canada firm. His post rouly costs the aterest of the money invested. He is standing in to make bed-room sets, and other kinds of furniture, and there is carcely a shades of a doubt that he we succeed. Begin ing cautiously, and with an eye to all due economy, there is great reason to expect abiding - ccess If Mr. Henderson is able to start a furniture factory, here, it will be a grand thing for the country, and he will deserve the thanks of everybody. It is hard to estimate the loss the community sustains by money sent out from here to purchase articles, which certainly should be manufactured in our midst.
