

### A NEWBURG LAD

Comes to a Sad End in the Philippine Island.

BOSTON, Feb. 15.-A special cablegram to the Globe from a correspondent at Iloilo


"It has just been discovered as the result soldiers of the 26th U.S. V. have been tortured to. death by insurgents. The men were Dennis Hayes, William Dugan and Michael Tracy, privates of Co. F, under Camp. Wm. M. Tutherley. They remained behind the column at Calinog last November, to get a tuba, and refused to accompany the corporal sent by Captain Tutherley to bring them along. They were captured by the insurgents hanging on the rear of the column and were cruelly tortured and murdered by the rebels in the public plaza of Calinog; the action being countenarced by the padre (Spanish priest). The padre has since left his parish for the mountains. When the men remained behind they had with them their full equipment of arms and ammunition, which was captured. All three men were members of Co. F. 26th regiment. Wm. Dugan, who was 26 years old, enlisted at Springfield, Mass., giving Patrick Dugan of Leominster, this state, as his nearest of kin. Dennis L. Hayes enlisted at Plattsburg Barracks, N. Y. He was 29, and was a son of Mrs. Jeremiah Hayes of Concord, Mass. Michael Tracy was 21 and enlisted at Lawrence In the regimental roster, Alick Track of New Brunswick is given as his nearest of kin."

LOWELL, Mass., Feb. 15 .- Michael Tracy came to Lowell from Woodstock, N. B., about three years ago. He enlisted in Lawrence, Mass. Tracy was formerly a night watchman in the Tremont and Suffolk mills in this city. He is survived by his father, Alexander Tracy, two brothers, Daniel and Alexander, and five sisters, all of whom are at home in Woodstock, N. B., with the ext ception of three sisters in Bangor, Me.

The Michael Tracy here referred to is a son of Alexander Tracy, of Newburg, and a grandson of the late Peter Gallagher, his mother being a sister of George, and Michael Gallagher, of Newburg. The young man is remembered around Woodstock. He left here a couple of years ago.
