



Slow but Inexorable Justice.

In October last Pietro Giaconi and Marie Bonelli were tried at Rome on a charge of sextuple murder by poisoning committed thirty one years ago. In our own country Eugene Aram were hanged for the murder of Clarke fourteen years after the offence. A man named Horne was executed for the murder of his child in the eighteenth century no less than thirty five years after the offence. There is also the well-known case of Gov. Wall, who was executed in 1802 for a murdered committed in 1782. Sherward was hanged at Norwich for the murder of his wife after a lapse of twenty years. But Sir Fitzjames Stephen recalls what is the most remarkable case of all. He prosecuted as counsel for the Crown, in 1863, a man who was charged with stealing a leaf from a par-
