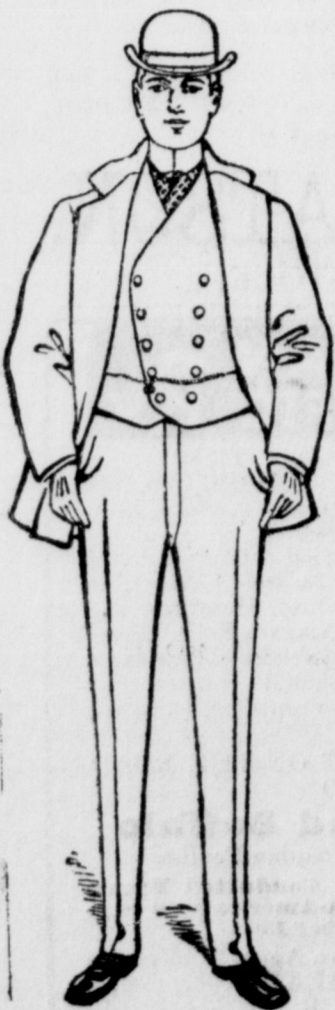

**The Liquor Question in English Methodism.**

The connection of church officers with the liquor traffic was recently discussed in the Wesleyan Methodist conference, which has been in session at Newcastle-on-Tyne, and the debate on this question brings into very strong relief the difference between the views held by Canadian Methodists and by their English brethren respectively concerning the use of intoxicating liquors. In the session of July 26th the Rev. Thomas Champness, the editor of the Joyful News, and an evangelist of the highest repute, moved the following resolution—which he had unsuccessfully introduced in 1898, 1899 and 1900: "That in view of sorrow and sin caused by the drinking habits of the people, the conference thinks it in the highest degree undesirable that any person directly engaged in the liquor traffic should be nominated for office in the Wesleyan Methodist church." There are two things about this resolution which are of portentous significance to the Canadian Methodist, and these are, first, that there should be any need of introducing such a resolution, and secondly, that when introduced it should be voted down with practical unanimity, and that, too, for four successive conferences. In Canada a liquor dealer cannot even be a member of the Methodist church, much less an office holder. The Rev. Mr. Brade-field, who seconded the Champness resolution, justified himself altogether on Biblical grounds, pointing out that the Bible expressly forbade the choosing as church officials those who were "greedy of filthy lucre," and maintaining that liquor sellers came under this head inasmuch as they derive their profits from the "excessive and wasteful consumption" of liquor. But he thought it right to add, apparently by way of apology, that he "was one of those who, in spite of all that has been spoken on the subject for these many years, would not hesitate to call alcoholic liquors good creatures of God. It must be perfectly obvious, then, that he, at any rate, could not take up the position that there was anything wrong per se in selling a liquor of which he, for one, was sure there was nothing wrong in drinking." In the same strain spoke Dr. Allen, the ex-president of the conference, who moved an amendment declining to meddle with the matter, and who said among other things that he "had no doubt that night, before retiring to rest, a good many thousand men bearing a Christian character and giving Christian testimony for the past thirty, forty or fifty years, would take a little whiskey and water. Was any man in that conference prepared to say a man who does that breaks the eternal law of righteousness?" A layman named Slack who proclaimed himself a total abstainer said he "would never say that a Christian must be a teetotaler. Millions of the best Christians the world had seen had not been teetotalers."

Here we have a very wide divergence of opinion on a most important question between English Methodism and Canadian Methodism. The latter, which utterly refuses to accept the temperate use of liquor as admissible in its adherents, and annually passes at its conferences the strongest resolutions calling for total abstinence and nothing but total abstinence, cannot but see that, if its view is the right one, the mother church, whose offshoots encircle the entire world, the church of Wesley, of Bunting, of Newton must, in reference to the liquor traffic and the use of liquors, be still "in the gall of bitterness and the bonds of iniquity."—St. John Globe.

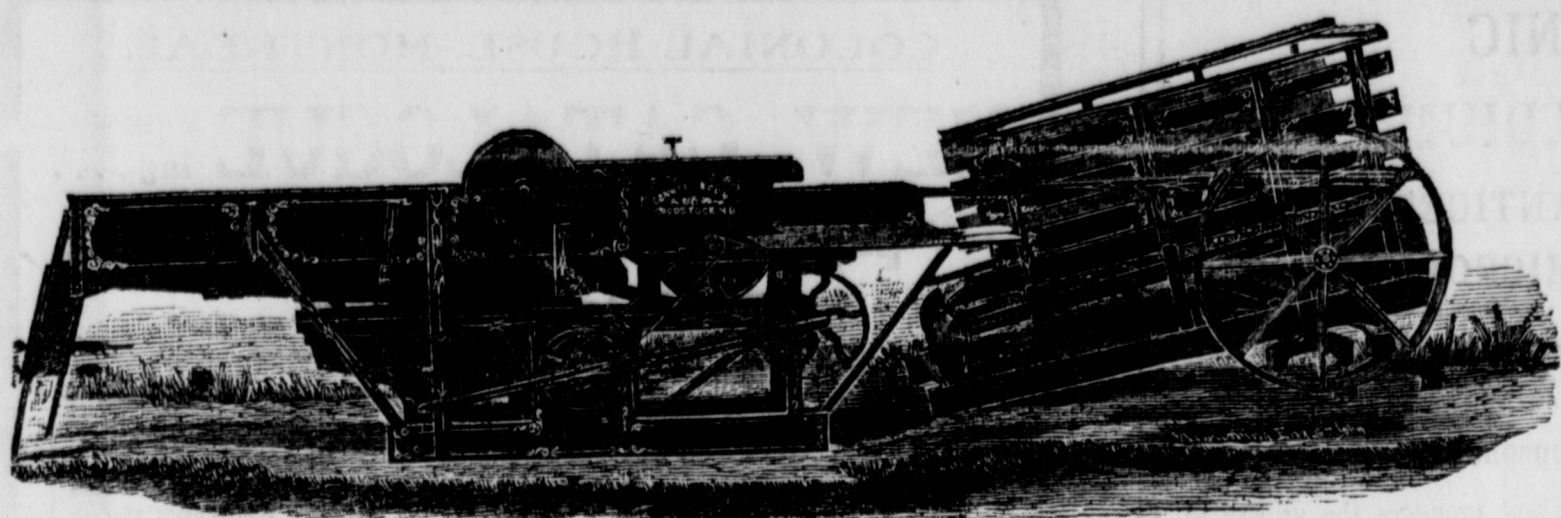

**Strikes.**

It is too true that there is matter for a grave indictment of the trade unions. Their guidance has too often fallen into the hands of the restless and malevolent ambition which thrives by industrial war. They have too often been swayed by the votes of the young, unmarried and less responsible members. They have too often had recourse to lawless and violent methods which would have destroyed the freedom of labor and against which the community has had to put the law in force, and sometimes to take up arms. On the one hand and suffering caused by strikes to the community, and often in a special degree to industries wholly unconcerned in the quarrel, it is needless to dwell. But combination was necessary to protect the rights of the working man and enable him to make his bargain with capital on anything like equal terms. The employers were really, if not formally, combined. How ruthless a tyrant capital can be, was shown with fearful vividness by the reports on which the British Factory and Mining Acts were founded. It can hardly be denied that the unions have raised the condition of the working man. A notable case was that of the farm laborers in England, who were raised from practical slavery, with an insufficiency of bare bread, by the unionist movement under Joseph Arch. Nor has anything which the unions have done been more odious or more subversive of commercial freedom than the means taken by some colossal trusts to kill the minor concerns. A better way, it is to be hoped, will in time be found than industrial war, or war of any kind; but in the meantime let justice be done to the cause of the working man.

While strikes are spreading we are still told to look to New Zealand for a complete cure. New Zealand, we are told, has put an end to strikes by its courts of arbitration. Gladly would we accept a panacea for this great industrial and social disease. But what we want to see and have not yet seen is a specimen of a New Zealand award. How and under what penalty can a rate of wages or any other condition of employment be fixed for a term certain without regard to possible changes in the market? If the employer, finding that he is losing by the terms of the award, chooses to suspend his business, how can you force him to continue it? If the laborer, finding that he can get more than the arbitration rate of wages, chooses to stop working, how can you force him to go on? What has been called arbitration hitherto has, in fact, been merely mediation, to which it is, of course, always possible to resort.—A Bystander in Toronto Sun.

**MILK PRODUCERS.**

The Carleton Creamery Co. issues the following circular to their patrons that will be of interest to farmers:—

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Aug. 31st., 1901.

We inclose statement for August, which we trust you will correct. We also inclose a card, will you kindly mark on it the number of cows you sent in the milk of for July and also for August. Please return the card to us through the skimmer or in some other way and much oblige. We will tell you the result of the information received later. The flies are very bad just now and the pasture is getting short, the poor cows, between the torment of the flies and the shortage of food, are naturally giving very much less milk.

The quantity of milk we get from each station is falling off so much (the wages and other expenses of skimming are about the same) that the cost of the fat is greatly increased, though the price of butter is a little better. If we could have the same quantity of milk in August and September that we do in June and July we could pay more for it. If there is any way you can manage to keep up the flow of milk this time of year we can certainly pay a higher price for it.

We have this suggestion to make. If you have a little piece of land 1/4 or 1/2 acre near the barn where you could raise a fodder crop of peas and oats, fodder corn and the like, and then when the pastures get dry feed the cows a good armful each day it might prove to you as it has to the government Experimental Farm, the most profitable crop on the farm.

We want you to make some money out of this dairy business. If the yield of milk in our county could be doubled, you would make a profit, and we could pay more for the fat and make something too. If we are spared until spring let us see to it that a crop of fodder is secured.
