Excursions to Buffalo and Niagara Falls.

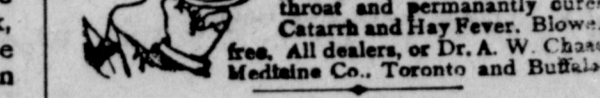
