REV. CHARLES A. LYONS of Providence, R. I., is conducting evangelistic services in the Advent church. The meetings are being well attended. On Sunday afternoon Mr. Lyons organized a Young People's Society of Loyal Workers in connection with the church. The following officers were elected, Miss Ruby Webber, President; Miss Myrtle Harmon, Vice President; Mrs. S. J. Parsons, Treasurer; Miss Leona Harmon, Secretary; Mrs. W. C. Raymond, Corresponding Secretary.

Town Council.

At the meeting of the town council on Monday evening His Worship Mayor Belyea announced on behalf of the committee appointed to present the address to the Duke of York, that the addresses of the Town of Woodstock was in excellent form and all the necessary steps had been taken to entitle the delegation to present it. He was particularly pleased with this as so many other towns had not complied with the conditions and had great difficulty in getting permission to present their addresses.

His Worship announced also that the C. P. R. had informed him that the sum of \$52 50 had been taken in at the Royal train last Thursday and they asked him to nominate some charitable object in town to which the money should be paid. He had decided to recommend that it be placed in the hands of a committee of the council to be used in helping some indigent families to pull through the winter. He appointed on that committee with himself Couns. R. B. Jones, Carr and Balmain.

A communication from the secretary of the Board of Fire Underwriters informed the council that, if they allowed oil in quantities to be stored indiscriminately in wooden buildings, the rate of insurance would be raised. A correspondence on the matter is now being carried on, between the secretary of the council and the secretary of the Board of Fire Underwriters.

Mr. Carvell, on behalf of the Dominion Government, asked the council to name a sum of money they would take, and allow the Government the perpetual right to connection, at the post office, with the sewer. The council said they would take \$100.

John Brown was relieved of any duties on the streets until such time as he could get the electric lights in first-class shape.

Dr. Brown, of Centreville, and Dr. Ross, of Florenceville, applied for permission to erect telephone poles in town and to use the town poles temporarily for the purpose of extending their telephone line into town. Permission was granted and Couns. Dibblee, Balmain and Lindsay were made a committee to make a contract with Messrs. Brown and Ross.

C. D. Dickinson's resignation from the Board of Health was accepted and Coun. Lindsay was appointed in his stead.

Debentures to the extent of \$2,000 were authorized to get money to pay for the dwelling house for the engineer of the water works.

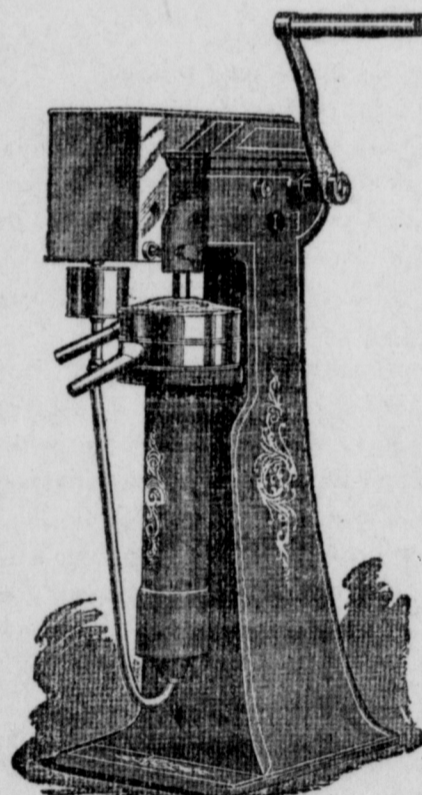
