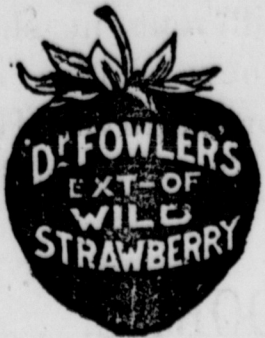

Advantages of Broad Tires.
(National Stockman.)

We see much talk of good roads, but they will never be made permanent until wide tires are more universally used. It is not, however on the public highway that wide tires are most advantageous. It is on the fields, through the lanes and about the barnyard where they prove of the greatest value. The State Agricultural College of Missouri found that on blue grass sward 3248 pounds pulled as easily on three-inch tires as 2,000 pounds on 1 1/2-inch tires. In a part of New York state wide tires reduced the cost of hauling 20 per cent., but the saving of draft is not the only advantage of the wide tires, for narrow tires cut ruts that can be seen across the fields for a whole season, and each one of these ruts serves as a ditch, which after each rain carries off the soluble part of all manure and other fertilizers.

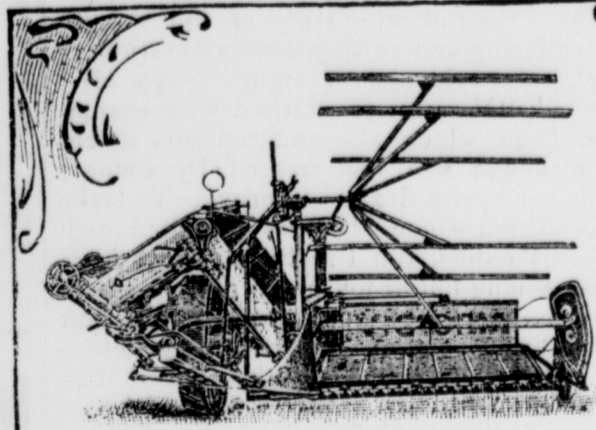

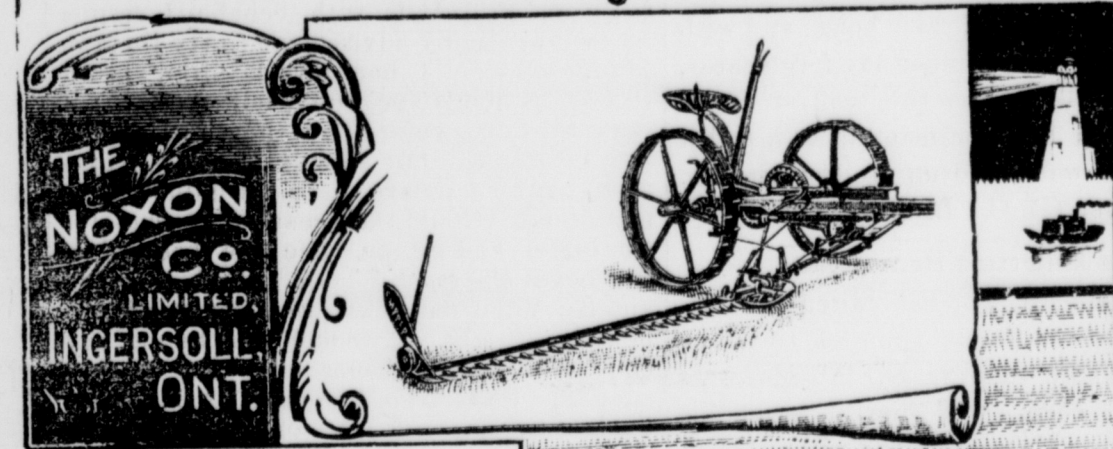
