United States Handicapped by Lack of Ships.

H. E. Armstrong, in Ainslee's: The greatest of all the American exporter's grievances is that the ships of other nations, chiefly the British, carry his goods and derive the huge profits of transportation. Of the 2,178 vessels that entered Shanghai in 1879, only fifty carried the American flag. In the same year not a single American steamer was seen at Chefoo, although 664 British steamers were reported, and 130 German. Hong Kong reported only 48 American vessels, yet there were 38,713 arrivals of all nationalities, including the Chinese. Forty years ago, when the American merchant marine was crowding the China seas, Japan did not own a steamship. "Now," says United States Consul Fowler, of Chefoo, "they have the finest lines on the coast. The Nippon Yusen Kaisha 18 the second most powerful line in the world, and two or three lines are running to the United States." "The Great Northern Railroad," said President James J. Hill three years ago, "has been compelled to refuse the shipment of 60,000 tons of steel rails and 30,000,000 pounds of cotton-all demanded by Asia-simply because there were no water facilities by means of which this merchandise could be carried to Asiatic ports."





'I.I k-keep a b-boys' school; would you,' with a wink of the eye, 'm m-mind p-picking


out the t-tough ones.'

'Then I will t-take the t-tender ones.' "


