Perils of Cocaine.

Chicago Record-Herald: Dr. T. D. Crothers characterizes cocaine as one of the three great scourges of the world, alcoholism and morphinism being the other two. There is an enormous increase in the quantity of cocaine imported, and not more than one-sixtieth of what is now sold is used for legitimate purposes. The vice of cocaine is spreading alarmingly among the poor as well as the rich, as the drug is becoming much cheaper. A one-ounce package, which less than five years ago cost about \$6, can now be purchased for 75 cents. One result of this cheapening is that the cocaine habit is becoming common among tramps and paupers as well as business and professional men, and in New Orleans and some other parts of the South and West the drug is freely bought in 5-cent packages. Dr. Crothers regards the use of the drug, even as a local anaesthetic for surgical purposes, as exceedingly dangerous, especially in cases where the subsequent reaction is characterized by headache, lassitude, and depression. It is almost a specific for catarrhal troubles, and through using it as a remedial agent unconsciously many persons charmed with its speedy and delightful results, become addicted to it habitually, and finally become slaves to its use. The first effect of cocaine in small doses is to create a feeling of elation, of greatly increased mental and physical superiority and of freedom from care and anxiety. The morphinist takes it to relieve the sense of depression following the use of morphine; the hard drinker in using it banishes his remorse and obtains a sense of elation and abnormal exaltation. But the habitual cocaineist cannot remain long undiscovered. If he be a lawyer, a writer, or a clergyman he shows marvelous fluency and prolixity of speech. He has plenty of words, but they are apt to be irrelevant, and his sentences are involved. In letter-writing he betrays his secret vice by his diffuseness without directness.

Her Divorce Celebration.

"Come back here a minute if you have time," said a stationer to the New York Sun. "Did you ever see anything like this?" he added, as the customer approached. "This" was an announcement got up in regular wedding card style on heavy white paper. The stationer read it aloud:

To Protect the Duke.

When the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, Great Britain's future King and Queen, come to Canada the Canadian Secret Service will, says an Ottawa despatch to the New York Sun, have an anxious time. All the arrangements for the visit of the Royal couple and their party are being made by the Governor-General, Lord Minto, and it is understood that he has shown special attention to the measures taken for their protection. The assassination of King Humbert of Italy and the discovery that a gang of Anarchists had their headquarters at Paterson, N. J., have led to unusual precautions against danger from the United States. For some time past a Canadian Secret Service man is said to have been in New York and Paterson getting information about the known Anarchists and portraits of them so that the Canadian secret police may be able to detect and arrest any of them who may come to Canada. The police arrangements for the protection of the Royal visitors will be as complete as possible. All trains coming into the cities where the Duke and Duchess are visiting will be closely watched, and suspicious characters will be taken into custody and kept in confinement until they can satisfactorily explain the reason of their coming to Canada. Although the military in all the cities will furnish guards and escorts for the Duke and Duchess, it will be out for display, and the secret police will do the effective work of protection. For the time that the Duke is in Canada the secret police will be largely augmented by picked men, and some of these men will always be near the Royal party.

Rev. F. F. Eddy of Halifax while discussing our schools said:—

"I have a protest to make against home study. I hold that the school has no right to a single minute of a child's time outside of school hours.
