THE SMALLPOX

Provincial Board of Health Conferred With Reference to the Outbreak in Carleton County.

A special meeting was held at Queen hotel Friday evening of the Provincial Board of Health, which had under consideration matters connected with the outbreak of smallpox in Carleton County. Those present were Dr. Bayard, chairman; Dr. Fisher, secretary; Hon. James Holly and Mr. John McMillan. Dr. W. N. Hand, of Woodstock, was present and reported respecting the Carleton County cases and the measures enforced to prevent the spread of the disease.

Thirty-seven cases have been reported in Carleton County, all of a very mild type and all within a well defined locality and none within six miles of the town of Woodstock. There are no cases of recent date and the infected district has been effectually quarantined, and no apprehension is felt regarding the spread of the disease. There are no cases of smallpox in the province at present outside of Carleton County.

The meeting approved of the measures adopted by the Carleton County Board of Health acting under the advice and instructions of Dr. Fisher.
