The School at New Denmark.  
The following letter from the teacher of  
the school in New Denmark, Victoria County,  
N. B., to the Educational Review, St. John,  
will be read with interest.

"I would like to tell you something of the  
school where I teach. The address has told  
enough to know that it is in the Danish  
colony where, among themselves the people  
speak the Danish language, although the older  
ones can speak English when it is necessary.  
But when the children first go to  
school they cannot speak one English word;  
they don't even know what is said to them  
until it is translated for them.

There are five schools in the colony, but  
the New Denmark school house is the pretti-  
est and best furnished of them all. It is  
painted white outside, and the woodwork  
inside is painted a pretty slate colour. A  
year ago we made a pie supper and raised  
enough to get hardwood desks and chairs;  
before that the desks were so uncomfortable  
for the children that they were tired before  
dinner.

Hanging over our map of Canada, we have  
a small Canadian flag 24x18 inches and in the  
yard, half way between the school door and  
the road is a flag-staff, forty-feet high with  
balyards from which may sometimes be seen  
flying a three-yard Canadian ensign belong-  
ing to the district. These two are the only  
school flags in the colony, so the people of  
the district are very proud of them. In-  
spector Meagher calls on us twice a year and  
we are always glad to see him. I have been  
teaching among the Danish people for nearly  
six years and can speak their language to the  
children when necessary. While I write the  
children are talking Danish. I find the  
Educational Review a great help in my work."

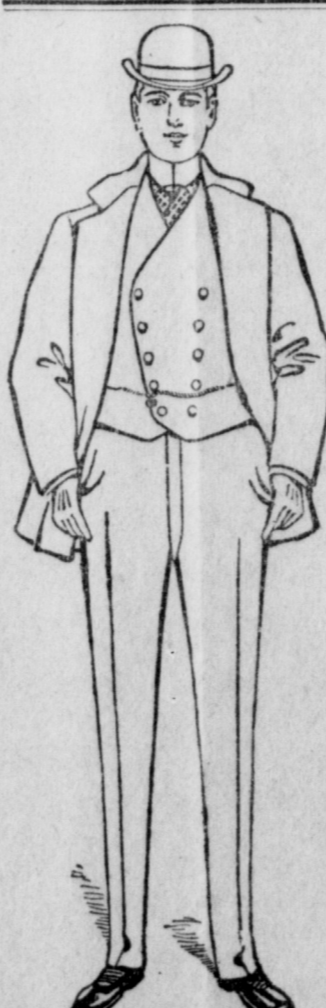

Tired of Their Names.  
More people get tired of their names in  
New York and seek, by legal methods, to  
have them changed than in any other city in  
the world. Nearly all of them are foreign  
born, generally of Russian or Polish birth,  
and are afflicted with patronymics that,  
rendered in English, are suggestive of a com-  
bination between a sneeze and a hiccough.  
It is natural that they should wish to avoid  
imposing on their friends such grievous  
linguistic burdens.

Recently a citizen petitioned the Court of  
Common Pleas, New York, for permission to  
change his name, averring that "by birth he  
is a Pole, and that being of that nationality  
his name is hard to spell in English, and that  
he has found it difficult to use it to his ad-  
vantage." And he went on to complain that  
his name was "unpronounceable," and that  
it even twisted the mail service crooked,  
sending his letters to Europe and the Dead  
Letter Office. His patronymic was Ratajczyk.  
It looks as if it might be used advantageously  
in place of barbed wire fencing, but prob-  
ably he never thought of that. The sym-  
pathetic Court promptly gave him the new  
name he wanted, which was Wilson.

The petition of Mr. W. F. A. H.  
Proschwitzky assigned a rather novel ground  
for seeking to change his name. He repre-  
sented that his name "excites laughter from  
those who hear it from its resemblance to  
'Scotch whisky,' by which your petitioner is  
frequently and constantly called. It em-  
barrasses him in introductions, and in busi-  
ness it brings him into ridicule and some-  
times into contempt. His two children are  
also called 'Scotch whisky' by their play-  
mates." Wherefore he thought he would be  
much happier in the great Republic if called  
Williams.

Loftier ground was assumed by another  
Russian who wished to shake off the name of  
Tobriskey. He affirmed that he is "desirous  
of forgetting himself and keeping his children  
from knowing as little as possible of the  
oppressive country from which he came, and  
therefore he wants for himself and his child-  
ren an American name." Tabor suited him.

Business considerations were plainly  
avowed as operative in the mind of C. A.  
Koscutzwitz, who represented that he "is  
desirous of commencing business in New  
York, and verily believes that he will be  
saved much trouble and inconvenience if his  
name is changed to Andrews." His wish  
was granted.

The change of name does not always prove  
satisfactory. A familiar example to old New  
Yorkers is that of a popular and able medical  
man, Dr. Roton, who got his name altered  
to Percy by the Legislature simply because  
he had become disgusted with hearing him-  
self addressed as Dr. "Rotten," or, worse  
still, being spoken of as "that Rotten Doctor."  
But his field of acquaintance and practice  
was very large, and the news of the change  
never seemed to spread all over it, so after  
two or three years of ineffectual struggle  
against his fate he was taken to appeal to the  
Legislature again and get his name changed  
back to what it was originally.
