Ensilage and Feeding.

Ensilage and a general talk on feeding forms the subject of a particularly interesting chapter in the Ontario Agricultural Report. In this chapter it is stated that a round silo 10x25 will hold about 40 tons of ensilage and give 15 head of cattle 28 lbs. each per day for six months. A silo 12x25 would hold 56 tons and provide 40 lbs. per day for six months. A concrete silo of 56 tons' capacity would cost about \$100.

Ensilage is considered essential in successful dairying, but it should have added to it wheat bran, pea meal, or some food rich in nitrogenous matter to balance the ration. Down at Cardinal, in Eastern Ontario, they are, according to Mr. Casselman, able to get gluten meal at \$16 to \$18 per ton, and this, Mr. Casselman says, gives greater value than any feed that they can buy.

The question of the size of herd which is required in order to make a silo profitable is also discussed. It is doubtful, in the opinion of Prof. Day, if a silo could be constructed which would serve satisfactorily for four cows for eight months. "It is," says the professor, "estimated that there should be not more than five square feet of feeding surface for each cow, and for the best results a silo should not be less than 20 feet in height. It would be practically impossible to meet these conditions for four cows."

In this connection, it may be well to quote the actual experience of G. C. Caston, Craig-hurst. In a letter to The Sun Mr. Caston says: "My silo is 21 feet deep and 9 feet in diameter. When well filled and well tramped, I estimate it will hold between 25 and 30 tons. I feed three cows and two young cattle (yearlings) all winter. I also feed some of the silage to sheep, and occasionally some to horses. The first year I filled it I fed four cows (or, to be absolutely correct, two cows and two heifers) from November until the pasture was good, and had some left. There was a few inches frozen around the side during the winter. This was fed after it thawed out in the spring. I fed most of what was left in the silo during the dry time in summer when the pastures were bare. It was all right after taking a few inches off the top. Where only a small number of animals are to be fed the silo should not be opened until late in the fall when the weather gets cold, and the heat has got pretty well out of it. And then it should not be dug out with a fork; that lets the air into it. It should be scraped lightly off the surface with a hoe or rake or shovel and the surface kept as level as possible."

Up in Oxford County, near Woodstock, too, I found last summer a farmer who, while using very little ensilage for summer feeding, kept this material in good condition by keeping a layer of damp hay or chaff over the top of it, this covering being removed every time the feeding took place. In this way the ensilage was kept in perfect condition right up to the surface. Prof. Day says that where corn becomes very ripe before putting it in the silo dampening it is an advantage.
