

Bacon Industry in Sister Provinces.

The development of the export bacon industry has heretofore been mainly confined to the Province of Ontario, but vigorous measures are now being taken for its extension to other Provinces. The main trouble at present is that the packing houses in the Province of Quebec from which an export trade is done cannot obtain nearly a sufficient supply of hogs to fill their orders or to keep their works running at their full capacity. The Laing Packing and Provision Company, with headquarters at Montreal, have written to the Dominion Department of Agriculture lately saying that when they get their new packing house in Montreal completed they will require some 5,000 hogs per week to keep the works running. With a view to giving farmers in the various districts in the Province of Quebec particular and helpful information in this business, the Minister of Agriculture has given orders to start a campaign of education, by holding a series of meetings in the Province of Quebec during the coming autumn and winter. F. W. Hodson, live stock commissioner, has in hand the matter of arranging for speakers at these meetings, and a number of Institute lecturers who have been most successful in attending such meetings in the Province of Ontario will be engaged.

As a result of the educational work carried on through the Farmers' Institutes of Ontario, packers say quality in the Province has improved by fifty per cent. in two years. Equally good results should be secured in Quebec by the adoption of like means. Nor need there be any fear that Ontario will be injured by Quebec's development. There is abundance of room for expansion in both provinces; while Canada exported a little over eleven and three quarter million dollars worth of bacon and hams to Great Britain during the year ending June last, Britain's total imports in those lines amounted to nearly seven times that amount.

A Great Industry.

A gentleman from Toronto who recently had an opportunity of going through the great Bell piano factories sent some notes to the Toronto Globe, which will no doubt be interesting to our readers.

The Bell factories in Guelph cover an area of 600x109 feet, almost an entire block. Besides there are the yard premises, embracing 12 acres. The buildings are four-story, with basement. The mechanical equipment is pronounced to be the most extensive and complete that modern enterprise could adopt. Every sort of machinery invented to facilitate operations and perfect workmanship is employed, and the whole vast and complex industry is run systematically and with marvellous smoothness.

A well-arranged and powerful system of fire protection is a notable feature of the immense workshops. The necessary power for driving the machinery is amply and admirably provided for. All the dust, shavings and debris are removed by machinery and utilized for fuel.

In the extensive yards are stored over 2,000,000 feet of naturally-seasoned stock, embracing black walnut, poplar, maple, oak, birch, white pine and other native woods, besides walnut from India. The oak is quarter-cut. The white variety all comes from the United States. Mahogany veneers of the highest quality and kept in very large quantity, and rosewood grades are also among the costly material, of which an extraordinarily great stock is kept. Steam is conveyed by an extensive system of piping from the factories to the drying grounds. The kilns contain 100,000 feet of lumber at a time. There is always in stock a reserve of 100,000 feet of kiln-dried stuff. Some of the walnut in the sheds is seven years old.

Among other stock are carloads of paints, oils and varnishes, besides tons of copper, charcoal, wire and zinc, the latter material being employed as box lining for the shipments to Australia and other distant points. The company own their own blacksmith, machine and plumbing shops.

Over two carloads of lumber are used weekly, 30,000 feet being devoted to packing cases alone.

The hands employed number over 500, of whom only one, engaged in the office, belongs to the gentler sex. The heads of departments and many of the ordinary workmen are skilled piano-makers, who have had their training in the great factories of the old world. Some are Canadian artisans, who have come of piano-making families distinguished for artistic and effective creations in various branches of the trade.

The output of organs is 30 per day, and of pianos the same number per week—a marvellous business when one thinks of it.

Our correspondent adds that during his tour of the great factories he was treated on all hands with the utmost courtesy and consideration, and he says he carries away very pleasurable and lasting remembrances of the visit.

Facts to be Considered by Beet Sugar Enthusiasts.

The Sun has more than once advised beet sugar enthusiasts to take into account, in estimating their prospective profits from beet sugar, changes which have recently taken place in cane sugar production. Production of sugar from beets has gone ahead of production from cane, partly because of disturbed conditions and lack of enterprise in Cuba and other cane growing countries, and partly because beet production has been encouraged by bounties in some of the most stable and enterprising countries in the world. Owing mainly to the bounty system, Germany, France, and other European countries are expected this year, according to the English correspondent of Country Gentleman, to increase their beet sugar production from six to six and a quarter million tons. The same correspondent also points out that Cuba will this season, profiting by a period of peace, produce a large crop of cane sugar, and the same correspondent adds that European buyers are coming more and more to favor the cane rather than the beet sugar. With Cuba at peace, the Philippines fairly peaceful, with the cane sugar industry in both these countries aided by American enterprise, and with European beet culture fostered by bounties, will it be possible for Canada to profitably produce beet sugar without the aid of continued bounties? We should base our calculations in this matter, not on present prices, but on the prices that may rule ere long, if present development goes on. But there is one satisfactory feature in the situation. If the cheapening of sugar continues as at present, as it seems likely to do, not only will household expenses—with sugar an ever-growing item in domestic consumption—be reduced, but our preserved fruit industry, for which sugar is a raw material, will be materially assisted.

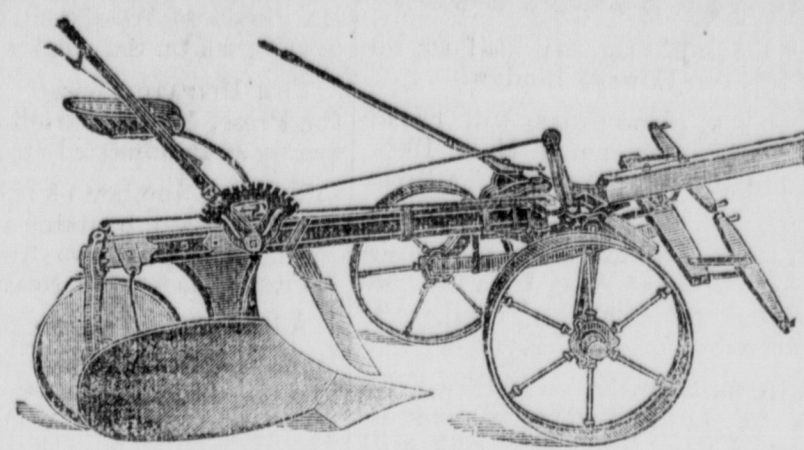

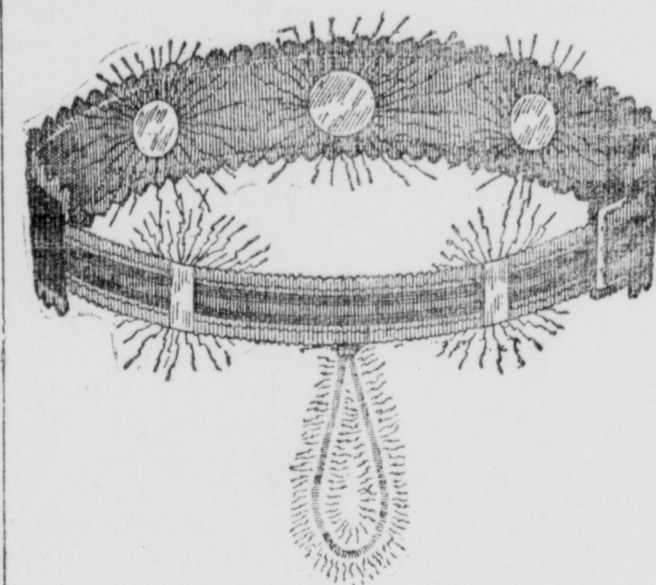
