> POSTMASTER HUME of Houlton has arranged for a Free Rural Delivery to go into effect about the first of January. The route as arranged will be about as follows: up North road as far as Jas. Abernethy's residence, across Ludlow road about one half mile into town of Smyrna then back on County road to Houlton. This route will cover a territory of 23 1-2 miles taking in 150 families and accommodating about 625 people. The results which attend this route will determine the advisability of establishing other routes through near by neighborhoods. Wherever the Free Rural Delivery is in force it is proving a great accommodation to the people patronizing it. The carrier has authority to transact all business that now has to be done at the post office. The outcome of the experiment is awaited with interest. - Aroostook
