

## A Modern Scourge.

MORE TO BE DREADED THAN AN OUT-BREAK OF SMALLPOX.

### BISHOP OF FREDERICTON

Consecrates Church of Good Shepherd, at Florenceville.

On Saturday, Nov. 2nd, the Bishop of Fredericton visited the Parish of Peel, Carleton County, and on Sunday morning consecrated the Church of the Good Shepherd, at East Florenceville. This church reflects the greatest credit on the little band of church people who have for a long time been hoping to see it built. It is fully equipped with all requisites, all well chosen and in good taste. The good toned bell rang out its cheery summons for service, and an overflowing congregation soon began to assemble. It was glorious fall weather, and the brilliant sun beamed through the stained glass of the memorial windows and added to the beauty of the interior decoration.

The sanctuary is covered with beautiful Brussels carpet, a strip of which is laid to the top of the chancel window. The centre light of the east window is in memory of Canon and Mrs. Lee of Fredericton, father and mother of Mrs. J. R. Tompkins of East Florenceville. The two lights on either side the centre are memorials, one in memory of Samuel J. Tompkins, the other in memory of Albert Brittain. One little window in the chancel has been paid for by the mite fund of the little children of the church. Two beautiful windows in the rear have been given, one by James W. Boyer in memory of his daughter, Ada, the other by John L. Saunders in memory of his two sons. Rarely has a church been so complete in all respects at the time of consecration; and rarely, if ever, has a church been built so quickly and well without seeking outside help. This is mainly due to the energy and task of the missionary, Rev. E. W. Simonson, whose praise is in all the churches.

On Sunday afternoon the bishop drove over to Greenfield, where in the Church of St. Barnabas he held confirmation, and 17 were confirmed, eight males and nine females.

In the evening his lordship held confirmation in the new church at East Florenceville. At this service every available nook and cranny of the church was filled to overflowing. The bell tower and the vestry which both open into the chancel were crowded. There were more than 360 present. The Rev. F. W. Simonson, who had also prepared and presented the candidates at Greenfield, presented 11 candidates. Most excellent work is being done in this mission by Rev. Mr. Simonson, who has been in the parish a little over a year, and has built a church and presented thirty for confirmation.

On Monday the bishop drove to Bristol and confirmed one very old man, and then took the train and went to Woodstock for confirmation. Here in St. Luke's Church eighteen were present for confirmation by Archdeacon Neals.

### Death of Li Hung Chang.

Li Hung Chang China's greatest statesman, died at Peking at eleven o'clock on the morning of Thursday, November 7th. It was Li who, with Gordon, saved China at the time of the Taping rebellion in 1869. Being viceroy, of one of the Yangtze provinces, he was in that emergency clothed with plenipotentiary powers, and had the wisdom to commit the military command to an Englishman, who, with a walking cane, led the ever-conquering army to victory. Since then Li has never ceased to be a gigantic, if somewhat mysterious, figure, and the fact that in his extreme age and physical weakness his country could lean on him, and him only, to carry on its extremely complex and desperate diplomacy, is the highest testimony to his unequalled capacity for affairs. Li was far more enlightened than most of his countrymen, and has on the whole been a progressive force. The fact that his era did not afford him any opportunity to develop a constructive policy made him perhaps something of a time-server, and the lack of any unity of purpose in the imperial councils and the constant peril which prominence in China involves, made him something of a self-sacker. But he was a man who, under favorable conditions, would have ranked with the great patriotic statesmen who have made nations great.

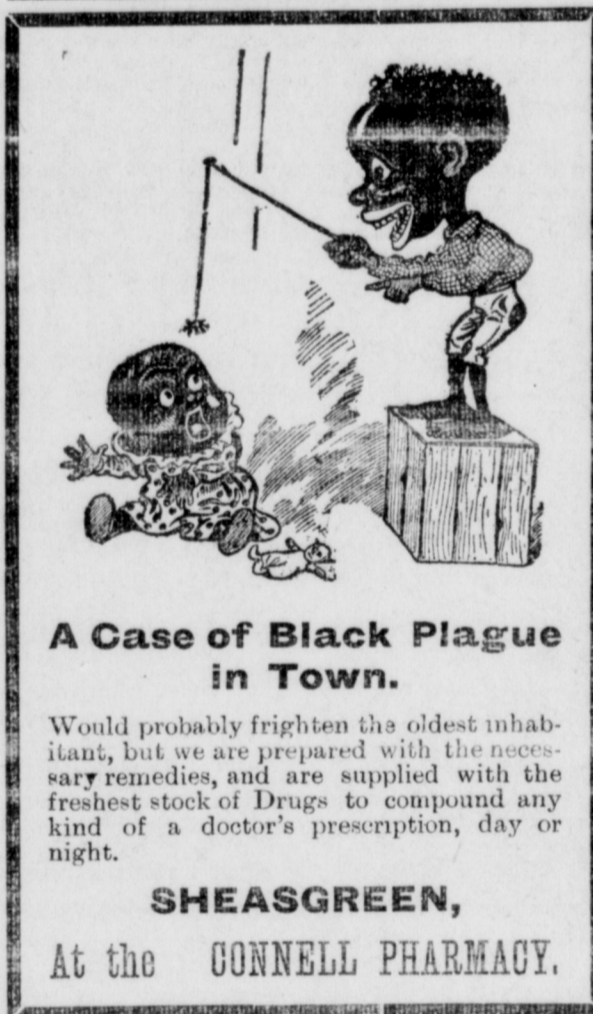
