> IT IS PROBABLE that the cut of lumber in the upper St. John river counties will be smaller this year than it was last. Though the price of spruce is very high, yet wages are too high to make it profitable to engage in large operations. Wages are so high in Aroostook County that many men from these counties are taking advantage of them.

WILLIAM HAYDEN, raises on Blossom Hill Farm, Grafton, some very large apples which he thinks are Wolfe Rivers. Some of them Woodstock, the guest of A. D. Holyoke. will measure 14 inches in circumference and weigh 14 ounces. They are bright red in colour, firm and of good flavour. They are winter apples, much better to look at than the Alexander and with a finer grain and flavour and grow to a larger size.

THE COUNTRY is sorely in need of raip. The ground is dry and some farmers in Jacksontown are hauling water to feed their stock. If the ground freezes up before we have a heavy rain it will mean an expensive winter for some people. The thermometer ran dangerously low on Monday night; one man said 10 degrees above zero. If this keeps up we will be in a bad way.

FRED MOORE the veteran lamberman is now operating in Aroostook County. He and his two sons, George and Miles started to build a steam saw mill on the St. Croix river at Griswald Station on the eighth day of October and on the eighth day of November they were sawing lumber. The mill has a capacity of 30,000 feet of spruce, 30,000 shingles and 25,000 lath a day. They are now employing 132 men.

On Saturday afternoon a party of young men drove from Woodstock to Centreville to attend the roller rink there. > E. W. Bell of Bristol turned out about 1800 lbs of bees honey this season. This is the largest output he has had yet. His crop would have been much larger but he lost eighteen hives last winter and just when the white clover was in bloom the great drouth prevented the honey in the clover from being in such a condition that the bees could get it. Mr. Bell is selling honey either in the comb or strained at 12 cts. a lb in quantities of 30 lbs or more. In smaller quantities he gets 15 cts. for it.
