The company obtained an act of incorporation with the object of improving the steamboat service between Fredericton and Woodstock. Mr. Brown took great interest in the project, and expected to have a new steamer on the route next season. Nelson W. Brown B. A., of Southampton, is a brother of deceased and Mrs. Dr. Turner, of Medicine, is a sister. Another sister, Mrs. Bull, is a resident of Lower Woodstock. A brother of the deceased attained considerable prominence as a politician in the West some years ago, and for a time occupied the portfolio of Minister of Public Works in the government of Manitoba. Another brother, Isaac N. Brown, died in the Klondike two years ago.

She was greatly respected in the community in which she lived and will be long and lovingly remembered by many who were privileged to be personally acquainted with her.
