One of Stevenson's Letters.

The letters of Stevenson are bracing. A piece of one written about 1880 to Mr. Had-den, a young painter who had recently been married, might almost serve as a thanksgiving sermon or editorial. He writes:—

You seem to be a pretty lucky young man; keep your eyes open to your mercies. That part of piety is eternal; and the man who forgets to be thankful has fallen asleep in life. Please to recognize that you are unworthy of all that befalls you—unworthy, too, I hear you wail, of this terrible sermon; but indeed we are not worthy of our fortunes; love takes us in a counterfeit; success comes to us at play; health stays with us while we abuse her; and even while we gird at our fellow-men we should remember that it is of their good-will alone that we still live and still have claims to honor. The sins of the most innocent, if they were exactly visited, would ruin them to the door. And if you know any man who believes himself to be worthy of a wife's love, a friend's affection, a mistress's caress, even if venal, you may rest assured he is worthy of nothing but a kicking. I fear men who have no open faults; what do they conceal? We are not meant to be good in this world, but try to be, and fail, and keep on trying, and when we get a kick, to say "Thank God!" and when we get a buffet, to say "Just so; well hit!"

I have been getting some of the buffets of late; but have amply earned them—you need not pity me. Pity sick children and the individual poor man; not the mass. Don't pity anybody else, and never pity fools.

The Coronation.

For once in a way the expected has happened, and the date which public opinion had assigned for the King's coronation has now been officially gazetted. On June 26th last official notification was given of the King's intention to celebrate his coronation some day in June, 1902, and it is not surprising, therefore, that Thursday, June 26th, has been finally decided upon. The royal proclamation is an interesting document, not only because of its novelty, but also because of its curious phraseology.

Having announced the date of the coronation, the proclamation goes on to say:—"We do hereby strictly charge and command all our loving subjects, whom it may concern, that all persons, of what rank or quality so ever they be, who, either on our letters to them directed, or by reason of their office and tenures or otherwise, are to do any service at the time of our coronation, do duly give their attendance at said solemnity in all respects furnished and appointed as to so great a solemnity appertaineth, and answerable to the dignities and places which every one of them respectively holdeth and enjoyeth, and of this they or any of them are not to fail, as they will answer contrary at their perils."

One Breed of Fowls Enough.

A single breed is better to have about than a dozen different kinds. There are many reasons for this. When considered from the fancier's standpoint, a single breed is about all one person can successfully care for, unless the fancier's whole time and attention are given to them. If this can be done, then as many varieties as there is space to accommodate may be kept to advantage. But even then it will be found that the fancier who puts his whole energy into one variety will progress more rapidly than the one devoting himself to many varieties. When taken from the standpoint of eggs for market, it will be found that it is more attractive for customers to have all the eggs as near alike as two hens' eggs can be; when for market poultry, it is to the credit of the seller to send to market a whole killing that are alike; and when it comes to the care of the fowls, one soon learns the habits and eating capacity of the one variety, and thus in feeding and treating them all alike good average results will be realized. But when they are in the flock, the active Leghorn with the less active larger breeds, when fed together, the active fowl will get too much, while the slower-moving fowl will not have enough. For this reason, when kept in yards or colonies, it is better to keep hens to themselves and pullets to themselves.—Country Gentleman.

Snow Fireplaces.

Sixty degrees below zero is the frightfully cold atmosphere in which Alaskan gold-hunters must often work. They make fireplaces of snow in that desolate region. The snow is pressed into blocks like bricks and a fireplace two or three feet square is built with them. When the fire is lighted the snow, of course, melts on the surface; but when the fire is out this freezes so hard that the next fire causes it to become only damp. A snow fireplace used only for cooking purposes will last for an entire winter.
