House of Commons.

In the House of Commons on Friday, March 1st, Hon. John Costigan moved a resolution that the declaration to be made by his majesty the King in connection with the coronation ceremonies should be amended by eliminating therefrom certain words which are offensive to Roman Catholics.

An amendment was agreed upon by which the resolution read:—

"That in the opinion of this house the declaration referred to in the above mentioned act of settlement should be amended by eliminating therefrom all those expressions which are especially offensive to the religious belief of any subjects of the British Crown."

There were 125 yeas and 19 nays. Those who voted against the motion as amended were Wallace, Sproule, Taylor, Wilmot (Sunbury and Queens), Carscallon, Reid, Clarke, Roche, Alcorn, Robinson, Sherrit, Johnson, (Cardwell), Tolton, Lavell, Kidd, Blain and Lennox (all Conservatives), and Oliver (Ind., Liberal).

ABOLITION OF JUSTICES CIVIL COURTS

One of the most important bills before the New Brunswick Legislature is that for the establishment of District Courts. To bring it home to Carleton County: There shall be a District Court for each parish except that in the Parish of Woodstock there shall be one District Court for the Town of Woodstock and the northern part of the parish and another for the lower part of the parish. There shall be only one such court in each district. The civil jurisdiction of Justices Civil Courts, of the parish court commissioners, and of the Town of Woodstock Civil Court is abolished. Each District Court shall be presided over by a commissioner to be appointed by the Local Government and in incorporated towns such commissioner shall be a barrister of five years standing unless there is already a police magistrate having civil jurisdiction in such town and in that case the police magistrate may receive the appointment.

Each District Court shall have civil jurisdiction in actions of debt up to \$40.00 and in actions of tort up to \$20.00 unless the summons is issued by an attorney, when the jurisdiction is double the above amounts in each case.

The Attorney-General introduced the bill last Wednesday and it was referred to a special committee composed of Messrs. Tweedie, Pugsley, Hazen, Mott, Melanson, Allen, Appleby, Lawson and Carpenter.

A POINTED QUESTION.

A Chinaman Says European Women Should Loosen Their Waists.

"What is the use of binding the feet? It is the same use as tightening the waist among your Europeans. Do you tighten the waist for comfort? No. Is it to make one look taller or shorter?
