THE JAIL BULLED.

Not a Stick Left.-Strong North Wind Seves Court House and Village.-\$2000. 00 Insurance.—County Council holds a Special Meeting on Friday to Provide a New Jail.

The Carleton County Jail at Upper Wood stock caught fire last Thursday morning and burned to the ground. Nothing is to be seen on the spot but a cellar hole containing the Horse Hoes and Cultivators in addition to wreck of a furnace and the iron frames of

The fire caught shortly after ten o'clock from a defective flue that ran up just where the ell joined the main part of the building. In a very few minutes the building was a mass of flames. There were three prisoners, only one of whom was under lock and key at the time. He was immediately released. Neighbours flocked to the scene of the fire but nothing could be done to save the building. The line of hose attached to a tap in the cellar could not be reached and the one stream would have been of small avail against the volume of flame. The men who gathered turned their attention to saving the build. ings across the road which were constantly catching fire from the sparks and cinders blown toward them by a strong north wind. If the wind had been blowing toward the village the court house and the whole village must have been swept away.

Very little furniture could be saved from the building. The things in the front room were taken out but a large quantity of furniture up stairs belonging to Samuel Jones, father of the jailer, was lost.

The loss to the county is comparatively heavy. The total amount of insurance on the building was only \$2000.00 and they expended about that amount in repairs and improvements on it last year.

Samuel Jones' loss was about \$750.00 only

\$250.00 of which was covered by insurance. A special meeting of the County Council is called for Friday morning at nine o'clock to make some provision for jail facilities.

After being the cause of so much irritation in this county it seemed a piece of uncalled for perversity for the jail to go to work and burn down just as everybody thought the irritation was allayed.
