Decrease in Hard Drinking.

The Buffalo Express says: "One of the most notable advances of the century just past, and one which has been commented on very little, is the decline in the prevalence of hard drinking among business men and, indeed, among the people in general. Half a century ago the average man of affairs, according to those who remember those good old times, began the morning with several eye-openers and repeated the prescription more or less frequently all day long. Whenever an important business matter came up for discussion, drinks were certain to be called for, and a sideboard was an indispensable piece of office furniture. To-day, however, it is certain that the man who drinks during business hours is the exception rather than the rule. There may be just as much drinking after the day's work is done as there was in the early years of the century, although that is doubtful; but liquor as a lubricant to business is no longer tolerated in any business house.

"Commercial travelers who used to get allowances for treating their prospective customers are now prohibited from drinking with those with whom they are doing business, and when you see a couple of business men standing at a bar in the daytime it is generally the case that they are going to luncheon and have a couple of hours before them before they take up business again. The change in habit in this regard is not based on sentimental or religious grounds to any great extent, but is a cold, hard business proposition. The increase of competition, the larger game that the successful man of business must play today, require the full use of all his faculties, and the man who would succeed realizes that he cannot afford to take any chances with stimulants."

What Would They Give?

Teaching Politics in School.

New York Post: Pupils in one of Detroit's High schools were taught some of their political duties in an effective way during the recent Presidential campaign. A regular campaign and election, conducted in accordance with the rules that govern these affairs in public life, were held. Public debates and party rallies in the assembly rooms from time to time helped to sustain the interest to the high temperature point, and served to introduce youthful spellbinders of surprising oratorical ability, who showed an unexpected comprehension of the issues involved. At the beginning of the campaign three days were devoted to registration. The school was divided into wards, election officers were appointed, and official ballots, patterned after the regulation ballot, were used. Out of the total of 457 votes cast, only five were rejected, and these were thrown out because of technical misunderstandings. Wise discrimination was exercised in voting, the number of "split" tickets being 230. This last feature was a highly gratifying one to the principal in its indication of independence in thought and action. To disarm criticism, it may be added that the "campaign was not permitted to interfere with the regular work of the school."

Double-Purpose Cows in the United States.

At a convention of Michigan Dairymen's Association Prof. J. J. Ferguson, formerly of Smith's Falls, gave a place on the farm to the double purpose cow, but believed every dairymen should be a specialist and seek after the best type. At the convention of Illinois Dairymen much stronger ground was taken in favor of the double purpose animal. One man was quoted who from 116 cows made a net profit of \$3,061. He bought his milkers fresh at an average of \$48 and sold them fat for beef at \$52. Another man with pure bred Shorthorns averaged \$50 per cow for milk sold at the creamery, and about an equal amount for the calves raised. He gave the calves the dam's milk for two weeks, and then skim milk, with a teaspoonful of ground flaxseed at each meal, following this with shelled corn as soon as the calves could chew it. He had calves raised in this way which averaged 640 lbs. at a year old.

The Coming Republics of the Pacific.

During the coming year Australia is, says Frank G. Carpenter in Chicago Times-Herald, to be one of the world's chief news centers. The Australian colonies have already gone into federation, New Zealand is preparing to join to its Government those of the Tonga and Fiji Islands, and we may soon have several independent republics away down here in South Pacific ocean, far below the equator and almost on the other side of the world. So far the people manifest no intention of breaking away from old England but the ropes which bind them to her are little more than ropes of sand, and the control of the King in nominal rather than real. Each colony has a Governor, to whom it pays from \$25,000 upward to act as a figurehead. Each maintains a separate tariff against the old country, and none will tolerate the least interference by the King in its domestic affairs.

Change in Irish Agriculture.

The character of agriculture appears to be changing in Ireland. The acreage in potatoes in that country last year was, says the English correspondent of Country Gentleman, 654,413 as compared with 705,665 in '96. Pigs have also decreased, but on the other hand poultry has largely increased, and an addition of 101,000 has been made to the number of cattle, the increase being largely milkers. A Danish dairymen said recently that if Ireland should awake to her dairying possibilities Denmark would be in serious danger of losing her pre-eminence. And Ireland appears to be waking up in this matter.

Don't make your own dresses unless you can do it really well.



Two Millions in Gold.

San Francisco, Feb. 16.—Carrying \$2,000,000 in gold coin, to pay the troops in the Philippines, the transport Sheridan sailed at noon to-day for Manila via Honolulu.
